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## READ BEFORE ORDERING

The prices quoted herein cancel all previous quotations made either by letter or in printed lists.

Prices include delivery on all plants quoted, anywhere in the United States, provided order is for not less than $\$ 1.00$ in value. For orders for less than $\$ 1.00$ in value, add 5 cents per plant to cover postage. Six plants will be furnished at dozen rates. Price per hundred, or in larger quantities, quoted on application.

Terms are cash with order. Remittances can be made by Post-office or Express Money Order, or by Bank Draft, payable to The Dean Iris Gardens.

We would suggest to those not familiar with the cultivation of the Iris, that the Oncocyclus and Regelia, and all bulbous species, must be planted in the Autumn, and nearly all others should be planted then. A very few species do better planted in Spring when new growth is about to begin. The bearded Irises can be planted almost any time in a mild climate like ours, but do the best planted in August or as SOON after as possible. Orders for bulbous species, as well as Oncocyclus and Regelia varieties, should be in early, by the middle of September at the latest.

We exercise due care to keep all varieties TRUE TO NAME, and hold ourselves in readiness at any time to replace, on proper proof, any stock that may prove otherwise ; but it is mutually agreed between the purchaser and ourselves that we shall not at any time be liable for any amount greater than the original price of the stock.
