SASS IRISES—1937

The Superiority of Sass Irises has been thoroughly demonstrated by numerous awards to them culminating in the Dykes Medal for 1932 to Mr. H. P. Sass' Rameses.

The points of superiority that distinguish Sass Irises are, first of all, color. Other distinguishing qualities are complete hardiness, vigor of growth, freedom of bloom and texture. Grown under the rigorous conditions of Nebraska's hot sun and drying winds, an iris must be of the firmest texture to withstand them. Many fine Irises which are lacking in substance cannot be grown under Nebraska conditions. A Sass Iris will always stand up under any weather conditions.

The Sass Brothers are the leading breeders of intermediate irises and have developed this early blooming class into a range of color, size and quality of bloom that rivals the tall bearded class. They have also worked extensively and have developed qualities of Dwarf Irises of the highest quality and have now in process of development a series of Fall Blooming Irises.

Iris grow easier and multiply faster than any other perennial. Plant them in a sunny location that has good drainage. The bulb or rhizome should be planted just under the surface, not too deep. The roots should be spread out and the soil packed around them.

The best time to plant iris is in July and August, although they can be transplanted at any time of the year when the ground is not frozen.

NEW TYPE OF IRISES

These are hybrids between the Oncocyclus hybrids and Dwarf Bearded hybrids. The following are offered:

STORMY DAWN (Jacob Sass, 1933)—S, pallid soft blue violet, darker at base. F, pale nerapaline blue with brown stripes on the haft, forming a blotch at the end of the beard. Two large flowers on 10-inch stems.....\$1.50

NEW 1937 SASS IRISES

This year's introductions are the following which have been introduced because of their magnificent coloring and other fine qualities which have stood the test of several seasons bloom:

MIDWEST GEM (78-33) (H. P. Sass, 1937)—Large, light buff pink, flowers with S. domed and falls flaring. Stems branching from center. 36 inches tall......\$20.00

OSSAR (24-34) (H. P. Sass, 1937)—This is a glowing, blackish red self. Not very tall, 32 inches, but low branching. There are many buds and often 3 flowers open on a stem. Flowers are of medium size of good shape and substance ______\$10.00

CASQUE D'OR (35-15) (Jacob Sass, 1937)—S. Old Gold. Greenish midrib. F. Velvety rays maroon. Reverse of fall is Olive Lake. Bronze stripes on haft. Old Gold margin on edge of falls. Large flowers on 34-inch well branched stalks \$20.00

AMBERA (H. P. Sass, 1931)—A topnotcher light yellow intermediate of great size, vigorous and free blooming. Amber yellow self, 30 inches. (Honorable Mention, 1931)

AMENTI (H. P. Sass, 1936)—S, grayish vinaceous. F, light mauve. Beard pale yellow. 36-inch branching stem \$10.00

AUTUMN GLEAM (H. P. Sass, 1934)—Intermediate and fall bloomer. Citron yellow throughout. Medium flowers of fine shape and heavy substance.

24-inch stems \$2.50

AUTUMN QUEEN (H. P. Sass, 1926)—An everblooming white iris of the intermediate type which has a record of blooming every month from April to November. Flower of good size and quality......25c

BALDWIN (H. P. Sass, 1926)—One of the best of the dark blue purples. A huge Manganese violet self with an electric sheen in the falls on 40-inch well branched stems _______35c

BLACKMOOR (Jacob Sass, 1932)—One of the finest dark blue purples. Almost black when newly opened, lightening to blackish violet of uniform coloring. A free bloomer of great size. (Honorable Mention, 1931)......75c

BUTO (H.P. Sass, 1926)—A rich dark purple bicolor with velvety nearly black falls of great size and a great bloomer. Makes a fine mass. 30 fnches......25c

CAROLINE E. STRINGER (Jacob Sass, 1930)—In effect a beautiful pink tinted iris, large beautifully ruffled with yellow at the haft and a yellow beard. 36 inches ______25c

CHESTNUT (Jacob Sass, 1930)—The brownest of our plicatas. S, ruffled cinnamon drab. F, cream dotted petunia violet with brown stripes on the yellow haft. Handsome and unique......25e

CHIEF (Jacob Sass, 1926)—A fine blue purple intermediate, very dark. 22 inches 25c

CHURCHMOUSE (H. P. Sass, 1929)—A new color break greatly admired— brown iris, self Hays brown of Ridgeway. Medium sized flower on 36-inch stems......25c

CLARA NOYES (H. P. Sass, 1931)—A gorgeous blend of orange yellow, and red of Talisman rose coloring. (Honorable Mention, 1931; Award of Merit, 1932)...\$1.00

CLARIBEL (Jacob Sass, 1936)—A large flowered plicata on the order of Los Angeles. Hardy, 40-inch branching stem. \$10.00

CRYSTAL BEAUTY (J. Sass, 1935)—A large flowered self of pure white coloring on 40-inch well branched stalk \$6.00

CYRUS (H. P. Sass, 1931)—Medium sized flowers of fine form and substance on 34-inch stems. Empire yellow with a much deeper splash at the end of beard, giving a glowing effect. Intermediate. (H. M. 1933)......25c

DORE (32-50) (J. Sass, 1935)—S, baryta yellow darkening to Empire yellow at claw. F, white with light yellow sheen. Haft heavily veined Empire yellow. Deep yellow beard. A yellow stripe extends along the edge of the falls. Large flower on 37-inch well branched stalks \$7.59

pouglas (Jacob Sass, 1932)—S light lavender violet. F litho purple shading to light lavender violet at the edge with brown shaded hafts. Flaring falls, pale yellow beard. The big blooms are held on 40 to 44-inch branching stems \$2.00

DOXA (H. P. Sass, 1928)—A most popular and well rated intermediate of great size and novel coloring. S light Chalcedony yellow. F olive buff with tint at center. Heavy substance. 20 inches. (Honorable Mention, 1932)

GENTIUS (H. P. Sass, 1934)—Intermediate. S, bluish violet. F, royal purple. 24-inch branching stems.....25c

GOLDEN BOW (H. P. Sass)—Large flowered chrome yellow intermediate. Rather long flowers on tall stems \$1.50

GOLDEN HARVEST (Jacob Sass, 1930)—Our first yellow fall blooming intermediate. Solive yellow, bluish at the haft. F yellow citron, haft sulphur yellow, stripped white and with a brown and bluish sheen. Distinct orange beard. Always a surprising and cheerful note in the fall \$1.00

GOLDEN HELMET (Jacob Sass, 1933)—S Ochraceous tawny at the edge, yellow ochre at the midrib and buckthorn brown at the claw. F Morocco red overlaid oxblood red, bronze haft striped Morocca red, prominent orange beard. Height 35 inches. Stem low branching. A striking brilliant variegatta that shines in any iris planting \$10.00

KING JUBA (H. P. Sass, 1931)—A clear colored large flowered variegata, the brilliant contrast between the yellow standards and wide solid deep velvety red falls, making this a striking and much admired iris. Very large flowers on 36 to 40-inch stems. (Honorable Mention, 1932) _______35c

KING KARL (Jacob Sass, 1925)—Beautifully ruffled light pinkish cinnamon standards. F cream sanded in an all-over pattern of liseran purple with a yellow beard. The bloom takes on beautiful rosy tones as it ages. 27 inches. (Award of Merit, Wisley Trials, 1931).....25c

 MAID OF ASTALOT (Jacob Sass, 1936)—Large flowered blue and white plicata. S and F, white with blue markings in throat. 45-inch branching stem.........\$10.00

ORIANA (H. P. Sass, 1933)—A pure white of fine form and substance, of good size, with a finely balanced stem 32 inches tall. This is much superior to the older whites \$3.00

OWAISSA (Jacob Sass, 1934)—Dwarf bearded. Medium blue self pumila hybrid. Small flowers on 4 to 8-inch stems _______250

PAPIO (H. P. Sass, 1936)—S, pansy purple. F, violet carmine. Early flowering intermediate. 28-inch branching stem \$3.00

QUIVERA (Jacob Sass, 1932)—A mingling of buff, pink, yellow, orange and brown, difficult to describe, but of unique beauty. S buff pink; F orange vinaceous

RED WING (II. P. Sass)—S, light brownish vinaceous; F, Dahlia carmine. Large blooms. 36 inches......35c

ROSE MIST (H. P. Sass)—Dwarf bearded. Blended pumila hybrid ______25c

SANGREAL (J. Sass, 1935)—A very fine yellow intermediate Fall Bloomer. S. Barnum yellow. F. Citron yellow. Lemon chrome markings on haft. Orange beard. 28-inch stalk \$3.00

SIEGFRIED (H. P. Sass, 1936)—A large ruffled flower of good substance. S, Naples yellow with a sheen of dotted purple. F, pale yellow and striped brown on the haft with purple dots along the side of the distinct yellow beard. Flaring falls. Large flowers on 44-inch branching stem \$30.00

SOUND MONEY (J. Sass, 1934)—A fine yellow Pumila hybrid that also blooms in the fall. 10-12-inch stems...50c

SPOKAN (Jacob Sass, 1933)—S sayal brown overlaid reddish brown; F oxblood red, overlaid blackish brown. Haft yellow with brown stripes. Prominent orange beard. The most brilliant of the red-brown blends. The blooms are carried on 36-inch well branched stems _________\$10.00

THE BLACK DOUGLAS (J. Sass, 1934)—S, dark violet. F, blackish violet. Blue beard tipped yellow. A fine dark colored iris, Branching stem 36 inches tall......\$5.00

UI/TRA (H. P. Sass)—The general color effect is blue. S Ultramarine violet. A very reliable intermediate fall bloomer ______25c

WACONDA (H. P. Sass, 1931)—A much admired, big red purple self of deep tone with exceptional carrying quality for so dark an iris. It makes a most effective garden group of deep red effect. A sister seedling of Rameses. (Honorable Mention, 1931)......35c
