The flowers are large, round and full petaled with no haft marks, and are carried on a low-branched strong straight stem 34 inches tall. It sets seed well, but has no pollen. This peach pink flower with tangerine beard is carried on a strong well-branched 38-inch stem. A main bloom stem produces 12 flowers. A self of the deepest shade of violet (R.H. S. Color Chart). The very straight 38-inch bloom stem, which usually has three huge flowers open at one time, has never required staking. There are three buds in each bud socket which produce from 12 to 15 flowers on each main bloom stem. This gives a very long season of bloom. No. 46-35 — 44-43 X Zantha Dykes Medal 1953

A truly new flower and combination of color in the Iris world. The buds are bright yellow because the under side of the open fall is yellow and the top side is faced with white. The heart of the flower is bright yellow, which shades off to almost white at the bottom of the falls and the top of the standards. Both standards and falls are ruffled. The haft is very wide with gold threads radiating from the yellow beard. It blooms very late in the season; is winter hardy; 38 inches tall. H. C. 1949; A. M. 1951; No. 1, 100 Best 1957.
