Notes from the Editor:

Well! Here it is summer again, and time for our newsletter. As I write this I can hear the weather report on the T.V. and it's 118 degrees outside. Obviously we have to get up about 5:00 am to do any weeding here. So it's a good time for me to work on the newsletter. As usual I'm scrounging for articles. I always worry that we will not have any articles to print but a lot of the time at the last minute someone always comes through. I can only beg and plead so much, even I get tired of asking and I'm sure you get tired of me asking.

Speaking of summer one of the questions I always get asked is "How do you all survive the heat in Phoenix in the summer?" Here's some of the answers we usually give.

"Heat Myths About the Valley of the Sun"

The 1995 updating of the SPURIA CHECKLIST, titled SPURIA INTRODUCTIONS AND REGISTRATIONS, has been completed! Among other additions as compared to the 1985 to the 1985 edition are descriptions and ancestry of more than 200 new cultivars, bringing the total number listed to more than 600. Brief descriptions, section by section, are:

- 1. A list of all the known species which comprise the spuria group, including native habitat, color, chromosome count and name source where known.
- 2. A list of all spuria cultivars which have been registered with the American Iris Society, including hybridizer, year of registration, seedling number, normal height, bloom season, description, ancestry, A.I.S. awards, introducer and year of introduction.
- 3. Spuria hybridizers and their introductions. This listing is not complete as regards the biographical sketches as, in spite of repeated correspondence, a few of the current workers in this field failed to provide the needed information so we had to improvise with what we had, even so, we believe the biographical sketches may prove of interest.
- 4. Spuria irises as parents. This list includes for each introduced cultivar the defendants through the third generation (great grandparent where pertinent), plus awards granted to the offspring.
- 5. A.I.S. spuria awards. The current awards system for spurias is described, followed by a list of cultivars achieving at least a NIES award, indicating the hybridizer and the years awards were granted.

6. Sources of spuria irises. This was an attempt to provide the names and addresses of all known commercial sources of spurias. Additions and deletions will be appreciated so they can be inin the supplement for the checklist which is planned for 1997.

attention. Belissinado (Corlew '89), Small Package (Hager '86) and Diminuendo (Hager '86) are three excellent blueviolets that can fit in a smaller spot in the garden. Baby Chick (Jenkins '92), Gold Mania (Blyth '89) and Pieces of Eight (McCown '87) are three good small to moderately sized yellows. Highline Snowflake (McCown '91) leaves us breathless with its heavily ruffled delicately colored white and yellow flowers.

The cool wet weather of our bloom season also gave us the opportunity to note which varieties were susceptible to the virus that can plague Spurias during such weather. It was sad to walk through rows of gnarly mis-shapen flowers with blotchy coloration. The positive side to this is that not all Spurias are susceptible to this, and none of the varieties mentioned in this report showed any signs of this problem.

Overall, it was a long and enjoyable bloom season. A busload of Pacific Coast Native Iris lovers stopped by in the middle of our Spuria bloom, thus exposing them to the charms of our favorite Iris. Can't wait until next spring!

A mild winter, record-setting wet early spring weather followed by a hot dry month of May provided our Spuria iris with an ideal growth period. After enjoying a long and near-perfect bloom with the bearded and Siberian iris, we were anticipating the same with our Spurias (finally!). Unfortunately, this did not come to pass, as our weather turned cold and blustery, with the first good bloom on the Spurias smashed to smithereens by a hail storm. Our bloom season weather alternated between this and hot 80 degree days. It was long and quite interesting.

We felt challenged to find something positive in seeing our first Spuria bloom destroyed by hailstones. Which varieties survived this type of inclement weather the best? We feel many of those varieties with larger flowers tend to be "floppy" to begin with. Our difficult weather exasperated these tendencies and, as a general rule, those varieties put on an ackward and deformed bloom. Just the same, several varieties with large flowers did stand out. One of the real stars in our garden this year was **Handsome Is** (Hager '94), a rich reddish grape with heavily veined golden falls. **Fixed Star** (Hager '90) has large white flowers - the "cleanest" white we've grown. **Moon Shrine** (Hager '94) possesses the hugest flowers we've seen on a Spuria. It bloomed between storms and its humongous pale sulfur flowers held their form pretty well, considering their size.

We enjoyed a pair of good new reds this spring: Zamboanga (Hager '92) and Zulu Chief (Jenkins '92). Sage (Ghio '90) reminds us of Eleanor Hill (Hager '80) with its smoky violet

standards and heavily veined yellow falls. Imperial Veil (McCown '94), a large pale rose with yellow represents an improvement in its color class. A clump of Lookinglass Eyes (Niswonger '79) was a magnet for garden visitors this spring with its unique smoky lavender color.

Old favorites **Destination** (Hager '84), a bright almost orange yellow and **Jubilant Spirit** (Hager '83), a subdued lemon yellow joined with **Oro de Sonora** (Wickenkamp '91), a ruffled golden yellow to form an unbeatable trio of yellows. Whoever called an iris a "poor man's orchid" must have been looking at **Ila Crawford** (Hager '76), a white with tantalizing yellow markings. **Ila Remembered** (Hager '92) is a larger and more ruffled version of the original.

Joe Ghio's darks always grow and bloom well in our garden, and are personal favorites. This year Evening Dress ('84) and Capital Idea ('87) were the stars. Midnight Rival (Johnson '93) a ruffled and round rich reddish purple and Purple Concerto (Jenkins '93) are two new darks that held our attention. Mary's Beau Brummel (McCown '86) and Satinwood (Niswonger '83) are two very beautiful rich browns. The blue-violet color class is the most common, but Blue Bunting (Niswonger '84), Blue Lassie (Niswonger '78) and Color Focus (Jenkins '90) withstood the difficult weather and really stood out. The clear bright blue of Lenkoran (Rodionenko '84) drew visitors from across the garden.

The real stars of our Spuria garden this spring were the smaller or moderately sized plants and flowers. I feel the value of these Spurias has been overlooked and their performance in our difficult weather demonstrated why they deserve more
