SELF. An iris of uniform color.

STANDARDS. The three upright petals.

SUBSTANCE. Thickness of the petals.

TEXTURE. Sheen or finish of the petals.

VARIEGATA. Yellow, or near yellow standards. Falls, solid tones of brown or purple.

GREEN PASTURES (A. H. Heller). Very large blooms of chartreuse yellow, with a suggestion of blue at the beard. Tall, well branched stems. Very attractive. Mid-season. 40".

LADY MOHR (Salbach). Bred from an *Oncocyclus* Hybrid to a Bearded Iris, Lady Mohr has inherited the best qualities from both parents. From the seed parent, we have hardiness, branching, and height of stems. From the pollen parent, we have large, rounded standards and falls. The color combination is very unusual. The standards are oyster shell white, and the big, round falls are pale chartreuse, or greenish yellow, with prominent veining, and a dark patch of red violet surrounding the beard. Very free flowering, and remains in bloom over a long period of time. We have had blooms from early April to mid-May. Has proven hardy, and withstands heat, wind, hot sun, and rain. LADY OF SHALOTT (Schreiner). A *plicata* in delicate shades of pink. Standards, heavily flushed rose pink; falls, creamy white, edged with peppering of pinkish dots. Good sized blooms, well branched stems. Hardy everywhere. Mid-season. 34". **75c; 3 for \$2.00**
