THE LINSE HYBRIDS

1957 INTRODUCTIONS

HOT TODDY (Linse 1957) 33". Midseason. This redhot number is a distinct novelty, contains much Onco blood and may be a valuable breeder—it is untried. The form is flaring with broad falls and domed and overlapping standards and heavy substance. Good branching for the type. It is slightly bitone, with chrome yellow standards and green tinged yellow falls, the whole splattered and splashed with brilliant ruby red. A very good grower and hardy as an oak. From a Butterfly Wings seedling X Pineapple Sherbet, first of this breeding to be released, it is unique and different. Each, Net \$15.00

MELODY WATERS (Linse 1957) 36". Very late. This is Nscap 55-21, (New Snow X Capitola), and one of the most beautiful irises I have ever seen. It is a Sea Lavender violet (Wilson 637/2), deeper toward the edges and the beard is yellow. Very different to the general run of these hybrids, for its broad flaring falls are beautifully ruffled as are the standards, which are domed and overlapping, and it blooms with the latest, whereas most are very early. Substance is excellent, it has three branches and a terminal, and the plants are vigorous and hardy, having withstood 20° below zero. Each, Net \$25.00

WITH LOVE (Linse 1957) 30" to 36". Very late. Nscap 55-19. Distinct and different from all others in the over 500 bloomed from this cross. The color is a clear shade of light to medium heliotrope, and in the center of the broad spreading falls, around and below the blue tipped yellow beard, is the most unbelievable **huge**, dark purple signal patch—a thing of beauty! A lovely orchid for milady—with love! It seems to me that this belongs among that lovely group produced by Clarence White, of Some Love, Nelson of Hilly, Oyez and others. However, it is twice as large, taller, and the plants are larger, somewhere in between this group and the tall bearded. Hardy, with good substance and fair branching. Took 20° below zero weather. Each, Net \$25.00

We predict a brilliant future for this group.

HARDINESS:—Varieties surviving our subzero winter temperatures, sometimes to -20°, may be assumed to be hardy most anywhere that irises can be successfully grown. We offer only hardy, worthwhile varieties, proven in our gardens.

DAMASCUS BLADE (C. G. White '53) 48". An excellent smoky blend Onco-bred. Yellow beard and lavender blaze. Highly perfumed, large and very tall. \$5.00

DARK CHOCOLATE (Murray '54) 36". HM '54. Wide and flaring flowers of milk-chocolate brown. One to the customer. Net \$12.00

DARLENE WATERS (Linse '56) 40". Broad and flaring light blue-violet hybrid. A tall lovely with fine stalk, good growing habits and perfectly hardy. See the illustration on page 7. A gorgeous flower! Net \$15.00

DESERT TWILIGHT (Miess '52) 40". HM '52. Pastel shade of delicate violet-lobelia, shaded brown at the haft. Remindful of the older Ozone, but twice as large. \$6.00

DIANEVA (F. Cook '53) 36". A white ground plicata with bright violet markings. Large size, fine form and substance. \$5.00

DREAM DANCE (Larsen '54) 36". HM '55. This light golden tan self has a mother-of-pearl area in the center of the falls. Quite original and lovely. Very few plants, one to the customer. Net \$12.00

DREAMY (Linse '53) 38". HM '56. An opulent, sumptuous white that will amaze you! The billowy, crepe petals are simply enormous. Substance and stalks are excellent and it is a rampant grower. A handsome white bearded white. \$4.00

EASTERMOHR (Weidner '53) 40". Large medium blue seedling of Wm. Mohr, with broadly rounded blooms and fine stalks. \$10.00

EBONY ECHO (Tompkins '48) 37". AM '53. A large, deep carmine iris with satiny black overlay. The broad falls are held stiffly horizontal and are nicely ruffled. \$2.00

ESCAPADE (Tompkins '52) 36". Rich, glowing orchid with border of gold and golden beard. \$3.00

EXOTIC (Linse '54) 48". A brilliant tan-rose, suffused with gold and with lilac blaze. Colorful styles edged with lace. A massive flower of finest substance on a magnificent stalk. \$5.00

FABULOUS KATE (Muhlestein '50) 38". HM '52. A simply huge, flaring and ruffled yellow from Pink Formal, which should be a natural for breeding Flamingo pinks. \$2.00

FAIRY DANCE (Linse '55) 36". This lovely flaring campanula violet self is very handsome! Well held standards and horizontal falls, with a curl at the tip. The beard is yellow, blue tipped, and there is, perhaps, just a wee bit of that intangible something inherited from its part Onco ancestry. Net \$20.00

FANCY FEATHER (Muhlestein '52) 36". This is a grand plicata! Standards are golden tan and falls are medium yellow, bordered bright mahogany red. \$3.00

FANTASY (Hall 47) 35". AM '49. A lovely orchid pink with tangerine beard from the Flamingo line. \$1.50

FIRST VIOLET (DeForest '52) 38". DM '56. An exceedingly popular variety which won the Dykes Medal in 1956. It is a large ruffled flower in manganese violet, with clean haft and lighter beard. Not many plants. Net \$10.00

FOR SURE (Linse '53) 38". From Lady Mohr X Painted Desert, there is nothing else like it in the iris world. The medium large, frilly flowers are a creamy tan, with bright margin of Ecru or Pinard yellow in a fine line around all petals. A great brown beard lies on a field of violet and the blossoms are delightfully fragrant. \$7.50

FOX FIRE (Fox '52) 40". HM '53. Sensational large, deep yellow with lighter area below the beard. Very fine and a grand grower. \$3.50

FRANCES CRAIG (Craig '52) 40". AM '55. This Capitola seedling is very, very fine. A huge powder blue hybrid with excellent flaring form, substance and stalk. Recommended. \$5.00

FRANCES KENT (DeForest '51) 38". AM '54. Another very fancy number! Standards chartreuse-cream with flush of pink; falls lighter with pinkish orange beard. Flaring and fine. \$3.00

FRONTIER DAYS (Tompkins '53) 38". One of Mr. Tompkins best reds. Very vigorous and tall. Should be an excellent breeder for this color. From Bandit X Technicolor. \$7.00

FUCHSIA (Hall '51) 33". HM '53. New "fuchsia" colored iris with fiery red beard. Not too vigorous here. \$2.00

GENERAL PATTON (Kleinsorge '47) 38". HM '47. Brilliant solid copper brown, dark and rich. When this performs as it should, it's hard to beat. \$1.00

GENE WILD (Craig '52) 36". HM '54. This flaring and waved fancy plicata is a real charmer. It has an all-over pattern of wine rose on white. One of the very best of its kind. \$7.50

GOLDEN GLEAM (Miess '51) 38". HM '52. A horizontally flaring, rich dandelion yellow with cream striations at the haft, from plicata breeding. \$3.00

GOLD SMOKE (Clarke '52) 34". A hybrid of unusual coloring. A lustrous, smoky gold or gold russet with a suffusion of soft lilac below the broad brownish-tan beard. \$2.50

GOLD SOVEREIGN (Whiting '49) 30". AM '53. Extremely bright golden orange of medium size. \$1.00

GREAT DAY (Tompkins '53) 36". HM '53. Rich carmine red with black overtones. It is large and brilliant. Net \$7.50

HALOLIGHT (Schreiner '53) 42". A topnotch lovely self of buffy golden apricot. Very outstanding. \$7.50

HM '51. Fine plicata, with ground
color of Chrome yellow, with deeper
gold stitching. Center of the falls car-

Huge Oncobred of powder blue, suf-

MARY RANDALL (Fay '51) 37". DM '54. One of the loveliest irises in this entire catalog! A rich bengal rose, with heavy red beard. Broad of parts, smooth and clean, and an excellent parent. It fully deserved its Dykes Medal. \$7.50

MAXWELTON (Norton '52) 38". HM '52. Large flowers of metallic gold and bright tan on a fine stalk. Its form and substance are of the best. \$1.00

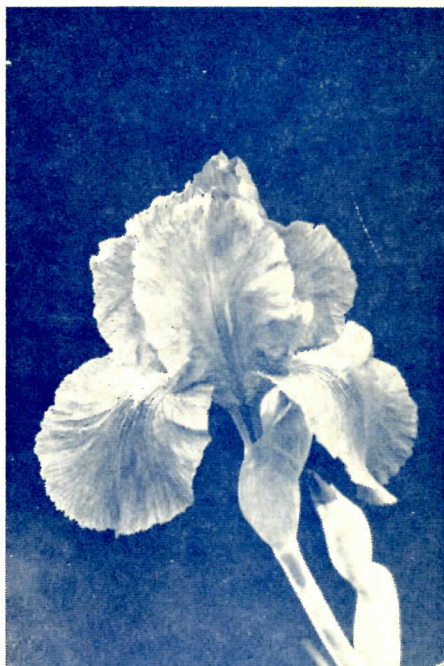
MAYAN GOLD (McKee '51) 37". A very brilliant golden orange. Broad, flaring and ruffled. Net \$2.00

OZIE WATERS (Linse '56) 36". An entirely new color in the hybrid line, deep rose-red, with a prominent black signal patch. The huge 8 inch flowers are highly perfumed, have beautiful form, good substance, and plants are healthy and hardy. From Spellbound X Capitola. A good one. Net \$25.00

MOHRESQUE (Keith '50) 38". Broad petaled hybrid novelty. It has tan-brown standards and falls of yellowish buff, with all-over flecking of purple. \$1.50

MRS. DOUGLAS PATTISON (Craig '50) 37". HM '51. Rich cornflower blue with flaring form and ruffled edges. \$1.00

MYSTIC MELODY (Stevens '51) 38". AM '55. This has cream standards and butter-yellow falls. Flaring form, nice contrast. \$2.00

NEW SNOW (Fay '46) 40". AM '48. A ruffled snow-white beauty, with contrasting bright yellow beard. \$1.00

ORANGE CREAMO (Muhlestein '53) 38". HC '52. Apricot-orange self, broad petalled and tall. \$7.50

PACEMAKER (Lapham '50) 36". HM '50. A rich and showy red of large size and good form. \$1.50

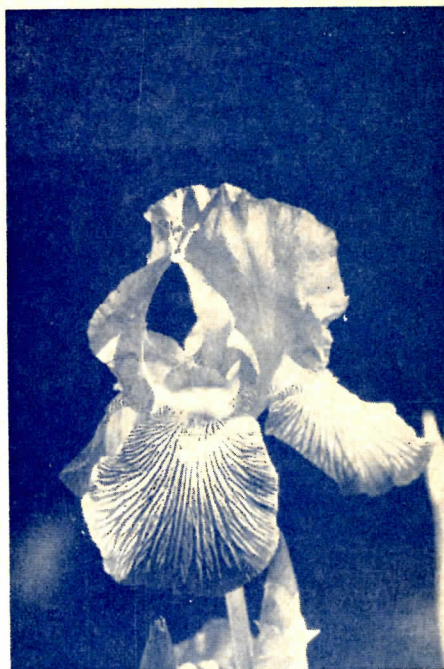
