This year we are again fortunate to introduce new varieties originated by Dr. John R. Durrance. In addition to his two we are pleased to present for your consideration three originations from C. P. Gordon of Denver, a talented iris hybridizer, fancier, and past RVP of the American Iris Society. The new introductions this year are:


ABOVE ALL (Gordon, 1964) ML 40" This tall, crisp, flaring white attracted much favorable comment last year from those attending the national convention of the American Iris Society. Flowers are very large and stalks shapely and stately, inheriting the best qualities of the parents, Swan Ballet and Mary McClellan. HC '63.

DENVER DAWN (Durrance, 1964) ML 40" As shown on the front cover, this iris portrays the subtle infusion of rose and mauve in the Colorado sky at break of day. The handsomely ruffled flowers are as large as any we have ever grown and are borne on well branched stems. Breeding is Pierre Menard by an unnamed Loomis ruffled blue plicata. Sdlg. No. D 58-90. \$20.00

GOLDEN MOTH (Gordon, 1964) M 30" An interesting shade of greenish yellow has come from this cross of Starshine by Maxwelton. A slight brownish overlay at the haft and a bright yellow beard add to the attractiveness. Sturdy stems of modest height make this plant especially suitable in windy parts of the country. Sdlg. No. G 59-11.

HARRIET IRVING (Durrance, 1964) EM 35" Crisply textured, flaringly formed flowers of Lobelia blue borne on stiff, sturdy, well-branched stalks make this iris α distinctive addition to the blue class. Broad-leaved foliage reflects the husky character of the plants. From Sierra Skies by Faught 11-K. Sdlg. No. D 58-30. HC '60.

SURFSIDE (Gordon, 1964) M 32" Delightfully ruffled flowers of light blue feature this attractive iris. The beard is light yellow and the stalks sturdy and well-branched. Parentage is Elmohr by Faught 19-H. Sdlg. No. G 59-8.

**Rhizomes are guaranteed** to arrive in healthy condition and to be true to name. A culture leaflet with many helpful hints is included with each order.

Our large stocks permit us to fill almost all orders throughout the season without substitution. However, we would appreciate your permission to substitute, if necessary, and in return we will see that you receive super value. Please list a few alternate choices.

Shipments start in July and continue through October. Iris do well when planted any time in this period, although we recommend earlier planting in northern and higher localities where a shorter season prevents good establishment of late-planted rhizomes. Some of our mid-western and southern customers favor September planting, thus avoiding the extremely hot, dry summer months. Unless you specify time, orders are shipped in same rotation as received. If you wish earlier shipment, please order as soon as possible.

Group Collections below have saved our customers money over the years and we are happy to offer them once more. This year we present an additional offer: Since large orders can be handled more efficiently than smaller ones, if you send us \$30 or more you may choose twice the amount in plants. If you send \$40, for instance, you may pick out \$80 in iris. This offer applies to all individual varieties except the five introductions on this page. It does not apply to any of the collections or group offers, since these are already substantially discounted. Pool your order with your neighbor and take advantage of this opportunity.

## A Word About Our Descriptions:

The name in parentheses immediately following the variety name is that of the originator, together with the year of introduction. Following this in most varieties will be a capital letter indicating season of bloom. E for Early, M for Mid-season and L for Late. After this the numerals indicate average height in inches. Please note that both blooming time and height are subject to seasonal variations. In our rounds of the gardens we haven't always had notebook and yardstick with us, so there are omissions we hope to correct another year. The following terms are also used in our descriptions:

Amoena: White or tinted white standards with colored falls. Wabash is an example.

**Blend:** Combination of yellow and one or more other colors, such as Prairie Sunset.

**Bi-color:** Light or medium standards and deeper contrasting falls as in Garden Magic.

**Plicata:** A light or white flower flushed, lined or stippled with a darker shade, particularly on the margins, such as Blue Shimmer.

Self: The same shade of color throughout the whole flower. An example is Aspendow

Variegata: Yellow or near yellow standards with deeper falls which may be either veined or solid tones of brown or purple. Accent is a classic example.

**Beard:** Narrow band of short, hairlike growth which comes from the haft part way down the falls.

Falls: The three lower petals of the flower.

Haft: The upper part of the fall.

Standards: The three upstanding petals.

Style Arm: The claw-shaped part in the center of the blossom.

The following abbreviations are used for awards of the American Iris Society: **H. C.**. Highly Commended; **H. M.**. Honorable Mention; **A. M.**. Award of Merit; **D. M.**. Dykes Medal; and this sequence is based on the ascending importance of the award. The Dykes Medal is the highest honor an iris can win.

The President's Cup is also an American Iris Society Award.

ACCENT (Buss, 1953) ML 36" Large, tall and vigorous variegata. The clean yellow standards contrast most pleasantly with the rose-red falls. A noteworthy addition to the variegata class. \$1.00

ADMIRATION (Smith, 1946) ML 36" A massive iris of rich medium yellow. Heavy substance and excellent form. HM '47.

AHOY (Tompkins, 1957) ML 36" Large, flaring, heavily substanced flower of carmine red or rosy toned cherry red. Brilliant and showy. No veins or haft marks. HC '55. \$2.00

ALICIA (Rawlins, 1948) M 37" Smooth silvery blue with cool, crisp iridescence. A medium blue with little veining. HM '51.

ALLEGIANCE (Cook, 1958) ML 38" Highly rated ruffled, dark navy blue. Silky, lustrous standards and rich velvety falls. Blue beard, tipped yellow. HC '57; HM '58; AM '60 \$5.00

ALLINE ROGERS (Kleinsorge, 1950) M 34" A blend of pink, rose and ashes of roses, with considerable gold in the blending of color, especially near the haft. HC '49; HM '51.

ALPENROSE (Schreiner, 1959) E 38" Dusty lavender-rose self with a silvery iridescence. Tall and well branched with widely flaring falls. HM '61. \$3.50

ALTAR LIGHT (O. Brown, 1954) ML 40" Heavily substanced and heavily ruffled flower of light buff-yellow. Center of falls shaded lighter. Hafts overlaid amber-bronze. \$1.00

AMBUSH (K. Craig, 1956) M 36" A big, very bright red blend. Substance, form and brilliance are excellent. \$2.00

AMETHYST FLAME (Schreiner, 1958) ML 38" Lilac blue-lavender overlaid with a soft pink sheen. Ruffled flowers are of heavy substance and the falls flared to perfection. HC '57; HM '58; AM '60; DM '63. Plant Patent No. 1793.

ANTHEM (Schreiner, 1958) EM 40" Fuchsia-purple tone intensified by a generous margining of bronze around the plushy, flaring falls.

Lemon yellow beard. HM '60. \$2.00

ANYTIME (Cavagnaro, 1956) ML 44" Large, wide, flaring white with pale chartreuse lines at the hafts. Flowers have characteristic Mohr shape, inherited from Lady Mohr. \$3.00

APRICOT FLARE (Suiter, 1958) EM 34" This flaring apricot is of interest to hybridizers working on orange-apricot shades since it is not related to the David Hall apricots. \$2.00

APRICOT GLORY (Muhlestein, 1951) ML 35" A smooth apricot pink with a self colored beard and a slightly deeper coloring on the hafts. Good form and heavy substance. HM '51; AM '56. \$1.00

APRIL SHOWERS (Craig, 1954) This tall, ruffled yellow is very attractive. Standards are light yellow and the falls have a silvery quality and the sunlight yellow seems showered on the surface with greatest intensity on the margins, haft and beard. \$1.50

ARAB CHIEF (Whiting, 1944) ML A near self of rich copper-cream of splendid texture and substance. Pure cadmium beard and metallic overlay at the haft give it radiance. HM '46.

ARABI PASHA (Anley, 1953) M 36" A very rich cornflower blue of tailored form and semi-flaring falls. The finish is sleek and the coloring is accented by a blue beard. Winner of the Dykes Medal in England in 1953.

ARGUS PHEASANT (DeForest, 1958) M 36" A smooth, bright golden Argus brown with self beard. Large flowers have broad, flaring falls and wide standards. HM '48; AM '60; DM '52. \$1.00

ASPENGLOW (Loomis, 1956) L 36" Vivid cadmium yellow self, shown on the Wilson color chart as saffron yellow. Flowers are nicely formed of good size, and usually have an interesting pleating or tucking on the lower part of the standards. Branching is good and growth habits vigorous. Aspenglow is a late season bloomer, and is valuable to help prolong the iris season with its bright, cheerful color. HM '58. President's Cup '63.

AZURE ACCENT (Durrance, 1963) EM 35" Here is an iris with lightly ruffled bluish-white flowers attractively accented with a blue beard. Under seedling number, before introduction, it was a "show-stopper" at the AIS Annual Meeting in New Jersey in 1961. HC '61. \$20.00

BANDMASTER (Hall, 1946) M 38" A powder-blue iris whose large vigorous-growing, free-blooming habits make it a favorite with all who have seen it. HC '43; HM '44.

BANG (Craig, 1955) M 38" This big, rich, bright red iris has attracted lots of attention and seems destined to go places. HM '55; AM '60.

BANGLORIOUS (Durrance, 1963) L 20" Flaring, smooth red self from Bang and Garden Glory. Just the conversation piece plant you need for your border. \$7.50

BAZAAR (Schreiner, 1955) EM 36" Colorful as a Tunisian bazaar displaying raiment of striking hues is this free-blooming wine plicata. Broad falls; leathery substance. HM '56.

BEECHLEAF (Kleinsorge, 1955) M 36" Coppery brown flowers enlivened by a violet undertone. HM '55; AM '59. \$1.50



- BIG GAME (Fay, 1954) EML 38" Rich, deep violet self. Especially noted for its long season of bloom. HM '54; AM '58. \$1.50
- BIG MARY (Durrance, 1963) ML 40" Here is a larger, taller Mary Randall, slightly lighter in color. For us it has been one of the largest flowers in the garden. Robust plants produce strong stalks that are able to support the large blossoms. \$15.00
- BIG UTE (Wallace, 1954) ML 36" Rich, flowering red blend with undertones of violet in falls. HM '55. \$1.00
- BLACK DIAMOND (Schreiner, 1951) M 38" This ebony-blue-black glistens with a lustrous black-silk sheen. Not as tall as some, but flowers are good size. HM '52.

- BLACK HILLS (Fay, 1951) M 38" A very tall ebony-black iris with lots of bloom, widely spaced on the stem. Those who have grown Black Forest will find this variety the same depth of color but much taller. HM '51; AM '54.
- BLACK TAFFETA (McDonald, 1954) ML A purple-black with wide falls that have a corrugated ripple down the sides. Hafts are very clean. HM '55; AM '57.

- BLUE SHIMMER (J. Sass, 1942) ML 38" Blue and white plicata whose large blooms are heavily marked and dotted blue violet. One of the most popular plicatas. HM '42; AM '44.
- BLUE SPINEL (Gibson, 1961) M 36" Large, spreading blossoms of deep blue just a shade lighter than indigo. Substance is like leather with an enamel-like finish. Free blooming. HM '62.

- BLUE THROAT (Loomis, 1956) ML 38" Lovely light blue with blue-tipped beard. The flower has poise and delightful shape with a wave in its flaring falls. \$1.00
- **BLUE VALLEY** (K. Smith, 1947) ML 36" Large, medium blue self with flaring falls and wide hafts. HC '45; HM '47; AM '49.
- **BLUMOHR** (Marx, 1949) ML 34" A fine lavender-blue seeding of Wm. Mohr. It possesses exceptional texture and substance and is a good performer. \$1.00
- BON VOYAGE (Plough, 1959) M 34" White standards with tinted edges of violet. Falls are white with a flush of violet below the beard. Violet tipped styles and white tipped beard. HM '60. \$2.00
