

Each \$4.00 E. D. Pink. A beauty! A very large, loose, flat blossom of Persian rose or

China pink edging to silver. The center has a collar of gold stamens with several petals having a splash of red. The inner large petals are deeply cut

and crinkled. Dark green foliage; strong stems. ADORN (Nicholls, 1962) Each \$3.00 L.M. D. Pink. F. A beautiful large rose type medium pink that is somewhat like Mrs. Livingston Farrand. The tips of the petals and petaloids are


silver shading to a deep rose at the base. The petaloids are finely cut giving the flower a lacy look. Stiff stems. AGLOW (Nicholls-Wild & Son, 1959)

Each \$2.50 L. D. White. M.H. A delightful creamy white Peony with a breath of shellpink over the center. The broad, waxy substanced petals are rolled outward, giving the appearance of a huge white rose. Strong stiff stems; clean foliage. Col. Nicholls rated this as one of his best Peonies.

A. G. PERRY (Brand, 1933) Each \$2.50 M. S.D. Blush. T. Light pink to blush. A delightfully formed and colored flower. Very nice.

ALBUQUERQUE (Wild, 1955) M. S.D. Red. M.H. M.F. A lovely dark red of grace and charm, with three rows of deep rich red petals surrounding a center of yellow stamens. Good foliage; strong stems

ALICE WILLIAMS (Nicholls-Wild & Son, 1958) Each \$2.00 L. D. Pink 28 in. Large orchid-pink petals have a faint silvered edge. Flower is slightly flat and cup-shaped with occasional red markings in center. Stems are stiff and straight; foliage is good.



ALLINE ROGERS (Nicholls-Wild & Son, 1959) Each \$3.00 E.M. D. Pink. A beautiful rose-type, salmon-pink, it is a delicate DORIS COOPER-pink having several splashes of strong red on the edges of the petals near the center. Texture has appearance of fine crisp nylon. Dark green foliage. Another one rated "A" by Col. J. C. Nicholls.

ALMA HANSEN (Cooper, 1946) Each \$2.00 L. D. Cream. T. Full rose-type, petals large and evenly placed. Strong stems. Flower has a flesh center fading to white at edges.

ANN COUSINS (Cousins, 1946) Each \$3.00 L. D. White. M.H. R.F. Full double white. Flowers large. The open flower needs support. Foliage is large. Plant is a vigorous and healthy grower and a dependable bloomer. The quality of the bloom is excellent. We think ANN COUSINS one of the best white Peonies.

ARMISTICE (Kelsey, 1938)

L.M. D. Pink. T. N.F. Large rose-pink. Strong stems, rose formation; very

good variety. One of the best. BANNER BRIGHT (Franklin, 1946)

Each \$3.00 L.M. S.D. Pink. Unfurling its bright blossoms to the breeze, this dark pink Peony attracts the immediate attention of all visitors. A very showy and brilliant flower, rather flat and somewhat semi-double. **BETTER TIMES** (*Franklin*, 1941)

ferous. Very showy. Good cut flower. BETTY MINOR (Nicholls-Wild & Son, 1958) Each \$2.00; 3 for \$5.00 L.M. D. White. M.H. V.F. A very pleasing paper-white. The petals are large broad, slightly creped and they recurve as the flower opens giving

the appearance of a huge white rose. Stiff stems; good foliage BIG BEN (Auten, 1943)

Each \$2.5' Each \$2.50; 3 for \$6.00 E. D. Red. T.F. Medium dark red bomb; opens well, large bloom on stiff stems. Continues to be a most valuable addition to the list of commercial

cut flower reds. Good in the South; good seed parent.

BIG RED BOOMER SOONER (Wild, 1963) E. D. Red. A very large, beautiful bomb type Peony! Waxy sheened self of clear, dark ruby red with color going through to back of the petals. No stamens showing. The loosely built bomb gives the effect of an informal flower. The strong stems are dressed in waxy foliage of good green coloring

CASABLANCA (Lins, 1942) Each \$2.50 L. D. White. T. Full double pure white. Extremely large flower of fine form. Stiff, extra strong stems. Giant foliage all the way down.

CELEBRATION (Nicholls, 1964)

V.L. D. Deep rose. T. Col. Nicholls described its color as deep rose purple, and our color chart gives it as Mallow Purple. The center of this very large, rose type Peony is full of small finely cut petals giving an airy appearance. CELEBRATION, a well formed and substanced flower, has no stamens. Strong plants; stiff stems; dark green foliage. CHERRY HILL (Thurlow, 1915)

E. D. Red. V.T. Deep garnet. Large flowers with a beautiful sheen. Stamens are very showy in blooms not fully developed. Excellent.

ACROSS THE MILES (Wild, 1973) W69-121 Each \$25.00 32" E.M. Dor. O.E. 6" bloom. 2\%" p.; 1\%" s. Most brilliant, most ruffled daylily I know; very creped too. Ruffles are even crimped! Very sharp brilliant lemon yellow, smooth colored self even into tiny, closed heart; color holds in 100°. Even after day in sun, still no throat or eyezone shows up. Petals open wide & almost flat; crimped sepals gently recurve. Excel-

AMERICAN INDIAN (Wild, 1973) W66-251

34" M. Dor. Re. O.E. 6" bloom. 2\\(\frac{1}{2}\)" p.; 1\(\frac{1}{6}\)" s. Bright & colorful is this burnt orange (red orange) self with small greenish yellow heart. Very ruffled petals gently fold back with very tips curling under some; crimped sepals recurve. Best planted in partial afternoon shade. Excellent scape,

sepals recurve. Best planted branching.

ART FESTIVAL (Peck, 1973) T2-161-69

Tetraploid. 30" M.L. Dor. O.E. 7" bloom. 2½" p.; 1¾" s. Bright, very deep rose pink with deeper rose veins; raised lighter ribs on ruffled petals; deep glowing apricot throat. All segments open almost flat with some sepals folding back a bit at very ends; sepals edged white with some sepals folding back a bit at very ends; sepals edged white separate back a bit at very ends; sepa or cream. By 7 p.m., after sunny day these lovely flowers have lightened some leaving red ruffles on petals. Husky plant; sets seeds. In good bloom 7/20/72. Parentage: T2-291-67 X T12-65. Excellent. Fall delivery.

Green heart blends into bright pale yellow then blends into brushed orchid pink cream. Each huge, wide open bloom of terrific substance has a slightly different form; sepals recurve with a twist at ends of some. 1000's of diamonds. Excellent. J.C., 1970. Fall delivery.

BLOSSOM VALLEY (Wild, 1973) W68-124

18" M. Dor. O.E. 6½" bloom. 2½" p.; 1½" s. Lovely light orchid pink bloom with lavender ribs opens wide from soft light gold heart which radiates onto very ruffled, crimped petals & minutely crimped sepals. Segments gently fold back with a tuck at ends of some petals. Excellent.

BORDER GIANT (Wild, 1973) W68-310


15" M. Dor. Re. O.E. 7" bloom. 2¾" p.; 1½" s. A giant of a melon which frosts pink in p.m.; glowing tangerine heart; ruffled petals carry orchid rib deep into heart. Crimped sepals recurve with a curl. Not a flower for person who believes bloom should be in proportion to height of scape . . . but 'tis lovely for a garden border. Well liked by garden visitors.

Large soft yellow throat comes far out onto segments air brushed deep orchid pink or light rose pink; coral pink stamens & pistil are beautiful set in this lovely large bloom. Wide raised lighter rib on crimped, ruffled petals; crimped sepals. Heavily diamond decked segments gently recurve forming almost a cup shaped bloom. By evening after 98°, blooms are 'out-of-this-world' . . . can hardly tell they have had a full day of sun. Excellent.

CAPE COD (Wild, 1973) W69-99

34" E.M. Dor. Re. O.E. 4-4½" bloom. Lovely deep wine red or burgundy self with small tangerine heart touched green. Sometimes last of season a white edging appears on segments. Deeply ruffled, broad petals overlap almost to rib of next petal; all segments recurve fairly tightly forming a very round bloom. Slow grower. Excellent. J.C., 1970. Fall delivery.

CATHEDRAL (Wild, 1973) W66-3013

36" M.L. Dor. 6" bloom. Very lovely apricot brushed ever so slightly with rose; becomes more pink after sun; color similar to JENNY SUE. Very broad petals overlap in heart from one midrib to rib of next petal. Creped, ruffled segments recurve fairly tightly to form a full, round bloom with ends of petals seeming to whirl to right in pinwheel form. Excellent.

THE NEW HARDY EVERGREEN WONDER PLANT LIRIOPE

The Border Plant Supreme

A very fine hardy evergreen perennial that grows in full sun or deep shade. It forms a compact plant that does not send out runners or otherwise spread beyond its alloted space. Liriope is a most valuable edging plant for borders or beds; excellent as ground cover or as edging for foundation shrubbery. It will grow right up against a large tree in dense shade as well as in full sun; can take the droughts and hot winds of the Midwest; the wet seasons of the Gulf coast; hard freezes of the northern and eastern states. It is easily grown and dependable, forming quickly in large clumps which can be left alone for years without dividing. Cutting back the old growth once a year is recommended; doing this before new growth starts in the spring. Do not set too deeply; crown should be slightly below ground level. Well rotted manure, sawdust or compost worked into the soil before planting or used as a mulch is excellent. 100 plants make 100' long border.

MAJESTIC (Russell Strain) Each 90c; 10 for \$8.00; 25 for \$15.00. Has disease-proof foliage of the darkest green. The double blooms are produced in spikes of a soft shade of lilac-purple, that stand above the foliage. The spikes are covered with flowers for 6" or more of their length. It has proven hardy in both the North and South. In the South it comes into bloom in July and blooms for two months. In the middle section of the country it begins blooming the middle of August and in the North a little later. Grows in acid or alkaline soil.

Japanese Peonies may be our most useful lactiflora parents, as well as being easiest to use. Having little or no pollen, they can serve as seed parents only. Protection by bagging is not absolutely necessary; however, pollen from nearby Peonies, borne by bees and/or by wind, may contaminate your cross; therefore protect with bagging if you wish to make absolutely sure. The Japanese seem to produce as many, and as fine, doubles among their offspring as do the doubles themselves, and the Japanese are easier to work with. Here again the Novice should not let himself be fooled by a handsome center of yellow staminodes. These are transformed stamens, and such a variety is no more likely than any other, to produce yellow offspring.
