
Greetings:

SAMURAI WARRIOR (Schreiner 1981) M. 34"

As if from the land of the "rising sun" here we have a soul-stirring dark cherry red. Samurai Warrior is a complete self with a distinguishing silken sheen. The beard continues the same red coloring but seems dusted at the top by a patina of silvery blue. Again, a different shade of red which is difficult to capture on film. 7 to 8 buds-very long lasting flower. See our illustration of this novelty at right. Seedling #1 755-2.

MT. OLYMPUS (Schreiner 1981) ML. 38"

A gift from the gods! An aristocratic Iris, this pure white dazzler distinguishes itself as the best branched white Iris with a multitude of buds. Its specialty is a superlative exhibition stalk opening many, many florets simultaneously—Grand Champion on the show bench. With parents like Christmas Time, Tufted Cloud and Winter Olympics it is bound to be a winner. An elegant beauty! See picture far right. Seedling #G 1475-2.

GOLDEN FANTASY (Schreiner 1981) M. 34"

Dreams are made of this. . .an incredibly vibrant, incandescent gold! Golden Fantasy is not a large flower but is superb. Its nonfading blooms are prolifically borne and evoke a feeling like that of fluttering golden-yellow butterflies. Its absolutely uniform clear yellow coloring mark this variety as distinguished. 7 buds; 2 branches. From (Royal Gold X a sister of Soft Moonbeam)quality begets the same. . .and more! Il-lustrated at right. Seedling #1 1234-1.

CLOSED CIRCUIT (Schreiner 1981) EM. 35"

This plicata will certainly stand out in any garden. Closed Circuit is a rare combination featuring briskly patterned wide violet-wine markings. These close a full circle around the glacial snowy white centers of each fall. Its standards are almost uniformly deep wine-purple with a flash of white at the midrib. 5 buds; extra large flowers. Quite exotic! Pictured below right. Seedling #J 465-A.




RUSTIC CEDAR (Schreiner 1981) ML. 35"

The warm atmosphere of a country-style cottage done in antique wood. While we cannot say Rustic Cedar is the very largest Iris it certainly rates as one of the largest blends. This terrific light gold copper-tan has flowers that are 8 inches from top to bottom and falls that are $4^{1/2}$ inches across! Most important though is the bright effervescent feeling that the color radiates. A vigorous plant that is really a "knock out" sporting 6 to 7 buds on 2 branches plus spur. An excellent addition to the blend section of the Iris rainbow. We have illustrated this beacon below. Seedling #K 1127-2.

With this addition of Schreiner's Iris, I anticipate the most beautiful garden in town. I will have 536 feet of Iris beds (All Schreiner's). . . I finally hid my 1980 catalog so I could stop edding "Just one More" to my order. This is my second year in the Iris hobby—nothing compares to the pleasure I have had. R.J.D., Dallas, TX

CRACKLIN BURGUNDY (Schreiner 1981) M. 35"

This silky deep red Iris is like a fine Bordeaux wine. Its true merit is appreciated more and more with time. During its trials it immediately singled itself out because of its truly different shade of red. Not a brown-red nor purple-red but rather a unique shade of burgundy-red. This rapturous self has no haft markings whatsoever and sports a like colored beard. Red Iris have had a special focus in our breeding efforts. This fine gem produces a nicely balanced stem with 3 ideally spaced branches and 9 buds. See for yourself how different this red Iris is in our illustration at left. An admirable hybrid! Seedling #J 446-1.

SCINTILLATION (Schreiner 1981) M. 34"

This charming beauty sparkles with a special light. First, one sees the falls which are a luscious bright orchid-pink. They are capped, in turn, with pure snowball white standards and then that beard—a sparkling blaze of true gold. Scintillation has an excellent three branched stem with lateral buds upon branches. It's 8 buds produce medium sized flowers that are nicely closed at the tips. Here is a different amoena bicolor worthy of the space it will occupy in your garden. 
"Here comes the bride"...with her new wedding dress. Our bride is richly embellished with florets of clear sparkling white. In addition she is gloriously crowned with a heavy gold wash on her standards and intense golden-yellow markings at the hafts. Starch-like substance and purity of coloring mark this gem for top star billing. A notable advance in the gold and cream-white group of varieties. Effectively, a gold crown reverse bicolor. Branched with 5 to 6 buds. Turn to our front cover and see this absorbing novelty. HC '79. Seedling #H 741-A.

LORILEE (Schreiner 1981) M. to ML. 37"

This worthy child of Cranberry Ice is a most pleasant addition to the roseorchid class. Note on our front cover picture how the standards overlap and hide the stamen. In fact, so broad are the petals that the standards meet underneath the style arms. This gives a ruffly character to the blossom imparting the idea of a demure pinafore dress. Add to this the handsome white patch below the beard and we have a touch of elegance. A strikingly colored and patterned rose-orchid. Well branched stems, 11 florets with the best substance. HC '80. Majestic and imposing as if from another world. . .This marvel is a fantastically sumptuous silken bishop's purple self. It has been the cynosure of all eyes at our gardens. Its absolutely uniform dark violet coloring and its large sized flowers mark Titan's Glory as one of the best Iris of its shading introduced in years. Measurements of the immense florets are imposing indeed—more than 6 inches tall and a full 5 inches across. This very broad petaled beauty has a long season of bloom. This most telling color and pattern make for a snappy sparkling addition to the blend class. Heavily budded stems (12 buds) with branching which is not wide but even more striking because they start very low—nearly at ground level. A stop light which grabs your attention! 
SPRING, PORTRAIT (Schreiner 1981) ML. 36"

Variety is the spice of life and this differently colored Iris will certainly add pep to any garden. Spring Portrait presents a combination of colors. Its standards have the distinct tone of "blue"-lavender, while the falls are colored a more "rose"-orchid shade. Surprisingly the falls even have a suggestion of subtle warm shrimp-pink. All this couples nicely with a very bright tangerine beard. The broad petaled flower has splendid substance and weather resistance. Watch this artist paint your garden with new life each springtime. NIGHT EDITION (Schreiner 1981) M. 35"

Here we have a remarkable study in contrasts! These medium sized flowers pack a real surprise by contrasting the dark inky-blue falls against lighter silvery-blue standards. The beard is still different showing lemon to light gold. Night Edition's stiff stems are nicely branched (3 branches plus spur) with 6 to 7 buds each. For those of us who grew "Toll Gate" in years past this Iris is a further improvement in style, color and finish on that precursor's pattern. See our picture on page 2. Seeding #I 336-1.



PIPING HOT (Schreiner 1981) EM. 35"

We are groping for words to properly describe the ecstatic coloring of this sparkling orange-sherbet Iris. The standards and edges of this airily fluted flower are a luscious shade of peachy apricot. Yet towards the center of each fall one finds a frosted clean white. This contrasts nicely against the bright tangerine beard. The gorgeously colored florets are borne on wide branched stems—most double socketed-one even triple socketed! Has 8 to 9 buds on three branches. Not a fast grower. See our picture of this sparkling beauty above. Seedling #H 743-F.

ROSELENE (Schreiner 1981) M. 38"

What verve! Here we offer what is probably the most unique rose-colored Iris that we know. Certainly one of the most beautiful. Roselene is a uniform self with a slight hazy dusting of rose to salmon coloring. As the florets unfurl their ruffly laced tips, one notes that a shrimp-rose beard is present. Before introduction we called this beauty by the garden name—"ashes of rose" but this connotation is unfair since it suggests a dirty clouding effect while Roselene is really a different (not a dirty) rose shaded variety. Its corn yellow beards are pleasantly centered on the uniformly dark handsome big blue flower. Standards are perhaps a bit "open". AFTER DARK (Schreiner 1963) E. 40" See page 68 \$2.00 Lusty growing, velvety deep violet black with ideal branched stem.

AMIGO'S GUITAR (Plough 1964) EM. 36"

The novel color hues of this Iris are beautifully and melodiously combined. The standards are buff with a violet infusion on the midribs. The falls rosy violet, ruffled and fluted. This Iris has a most pleasant touch of gold in its makeup. HM '65. AM '67.

ANON (Gibson 1975) M. 36"



This glowing new apricot-amber plicata pulsates with ruffling and fluting. Its standards are colored a uniform soft orange, while the falls have a uniquely interesting concentration of garnet-brown plicata flecking at the hafts. Essentially a close approach to being a pink plicata, the flowers are lightly lacy and especially well proportioned. The basic color is near white to pinkish lavender with the stipples and fleckings a bright and intense shade of lavender rose. Pictured page 61. HM '68.

ASTRO FLASH (Schreiner 1976) M. 38" \$7.50

A premier rich coppery blend with a blue blaze. This golden brown has a deft peacock's eye of blue centered in each fall. Among blend Iris this is an outstanding achievement. Its height of stem and superb branching make it a real advancement in this color class. Exhibition quality stems are produced regularly—4 branches, 8 to 12 buds. HM '78. See page 47.

AT SUNDOWN (Schreiner 1979) ML. to L. 37" \$15.00

A unique new blend Iris whose fluted and ruffled petals present a luminous blending of sunburst gold, rose and copper-brown from which emerges a blaze of rich golden tones in the center of each fall. This dazzler has excellent growing qualities, hardiness to match its beauty, and rigidly branched stems with 8 to 9 buds per stem. Truly a remarkable blending of amber russet hues. See illustration at right.

AUTUMN LEAVES (Keppel 1974) M. 35"

This new autumn shaded blend of caramel and rose brown sports a remnant of yellow at the base of the standards and an orange-yellow beard. Its falls are more heavily permeated with maroon that turns to brown at the edges. Excellent bud count and a vigorous grower. HM '75. AM '77. Pictured on page 36.

AZURE APOGEE (Durrance 1967) ML. 38"

Beautifully formed light azure blue blooms with a striking, surprising blue beard. Flaring falls, closely held, swirling standards, good branching and fine plant habits. HM '68. AM '70. Pictured page 60.

BABBLING BROOK (Keppel 1966) M. 38"

A welcome and worthy addition to the blue class. This light, French blue is invariably singled out as "that very blue" Iris. Has a light texture veining from its parent, Symphony. Pale lemon yellow beard. Exceptional for its fine form. Large and nicely ruffled. HM '67. AM '69. DM '72.

BAYBERRY CANDLE (DeForest 1969) ML. 36" \$3.50


Originally distinct and showy; a new color! The whole flower has a brassy metallic overtone. Almost brass green hued, it is a bicolor with rich chartreuse lime standards and really quite burnished brighter gold toned olive green falls with the color intensified around the bright gold beard. BEAUX ARTS (Plough 1969) ML. 36"



ADDED PRAISE



BETTY SIMON (Hamblen 1976) EM. 34" \$7.50 This variety has the same coloring as one would expect of a classical Nordic beauty. Flaxen hair and blue eyes! The flower is certainly a different bitone with its creamy yellow standards and delicately toned lavender falls. Its form presents us with a fluted and flaring flower of fanciful delight. HM AM '79. Pictured on page 40.

BICENTENNIAL (Ghio 1976) ML. 42" \$12.00

What an intensely bright combination of shining yellow standards coupled with white falls sporting a snappy laced gold edge! Here is a true bicentennial present with lovely form and yellow beards. Its extra tall stems sometimes require staking in windier locations. HM '77. AM '79. See picture above.

BIG LEAGUE (Schreiner 1969) ML. 36"

A super star in the big, broad petaled blue Iris. A most pleasing shade of medium blue, the large flowers are rounded, ruffled and have fine substance and bearing. The stem is strong and often presents 3 flowers open at one time. A truly lusty grower. Illustrated page 22. HM '70.

BLACK BART (Schmelzer 1969) M. 36"

Very near coal black, with a glowing undertone of velvety red, self beard, broad form and lustrous finish. Airily ruffled with liberal bud count, good branching. HM '71. Pictured page 37.

BLACK SWAN (Fay 1960) M. 35"

Sleek ebony black, wide petaled, rich dark blackish tone. Brown beard. AM '62. See picture page 69.

BLUE LUSTER (O. Brown 1973) ML. 36" \$5.00

An imposing very smooth evenly colored rich blue self, silken-like texture and a lustrous blue beard. Very good substance and extremely smooth finish. Excellent branching with many buds. A quiet uniformity of color is tranquility itself. Pictured on page 32. HM '74. AM '76.

BLUE MOUNTAINS (Schreiner 1964) ML. 38" \$2.00

Rich medium violet blue, large size, perfect form. Ideal stalks. HM '65.

BLUE REFLECTION (Schreiner 1974) M. 38"

A handsome firmament-like blue, a self of remarkable purity, the lemon white beard fits perfectly with its chaste coloration. A waxen sheen emphasizes its quiescent comeliness. A pure *light blue* Iris. Several shades lighter, more silvery than our famous SAPPHIRE HILLS. It is a bold advance to an absolute true blue. Extra long blooming, fine stems. 4 branches, 9 to 12 buds. HM '75. Pictured on page 37.

BLUE STACCATO (Gibson 1977) EM. 40"

A tall, precisely marked beauty with blue plicata edging. This rhythmic edging of rich blue is highlighted by the sparkling white background especially in the falls where the sharp narrow blue rim and blue tipped beards emphasize the cadenced contrast. Its flowers are airily ruffled and fluted. Far too few worthy new blue plicatas have appeared on the Iris horizon of late. An extremely welcome addition. HM '78. Pictured on page 9.

BLUSHING PINK (Rudolph 1977) EM. 34" \$15.00

A total beauty done in cool pink tones! Some experts allude to this most satis-fying pink Iris as a "blue-pink". We feel this does the flower injustice. It is intensely colored with delicacy and charm. This uniformly refreshing rich pink holds its color well and is always alluring. Our illustration is only an effort to capture its beauty on film—You must see to really appreciate its magic. HM '78. Illustrated page 14.



BREAKING DAWN (Schreiner 1971) EM. 36'

\$5.00 Few amoenas are graced with such enticing hues as this rosy colored amoena. Color as "the rosy fingered dawn" is embodied in the very large and exotic blooms. The crystalline white standards shimmer as if touched by the dawn's first rays, and extend to the flawless, smoothly colored rosy toned falls. Re-freshing! HM '72. See illustration page 44.

BRIDE'S HALO (Mohr 1973) EM. 36"

One of several enchanting varieties with a striking most definite and precise yellow-gold margin or edging. This border is about 1/8 inch like an applique of burnished gold on the satin-white main color of the flower. Each flower is frilled and very showy, lightly laced too. Immaculately clean, demure and entrancing. HM '74. AM '76. DM '78. Pictured page 27.

BRIGHT DANDELION (Schreiner 1976) ML. 37"

Yes, there are many excellent yellow Iris but few can challenge this multi-A flower of perfect form, with full rounded petals of fine substance. Its rich gold tone makes it alight with non-fading brilliance. Ramrod stiff stems hold its wonderful flowers upright magnificently. HM '79. Pictured page 60.

BRINDISI (Schreiner 1979) EM. 35"

This little joy is a bright coppertone to burnt orange-brown henna self. Its form is very rounded, as the falls flare to a near "flat-top" horizontal. The pulsating color is extremely bright and the beard carries the same predominant tone. Five inch flowers are sported on 3 branches and a spur with 6 to 7 buds per stem. See picture page 11.

BRISTOL GEM (Leavitt 1965) ML. 38"

A handsome, scintillating beauty of rich medium blue with a blue beard. Enormous flowers with petals so wide they almost form an uninterrupted expanse of rich blue. Sturdy stem. HM '66.

BUFFY (O. Brown 1969) M. 38"

This Iris, with its bubbly, disarming and winning ways, has tall well-branched stems that display the good sized rippled flowers to perfection. Domed standards are a pale Orient pink with fringed buff edges. The wide hafts on the falls are ivory pink with frilly edges. Charming. HM '70. AM '72. Illustrated page 7.

BURNT TOFFEE (Schreiner 1977) ML. 37" \$7.50

A unique smoky Iris that subtly blends a gradation of several colors. Its standards are medium red-violet suffused with golden bronze. The falls and beard have a center with a pronounced blue-violet wash that diminishes to the precise border edging of gold-bronze. Three branches. 7 to 9 buds. HM '79. See page 62.

BUTTERSCOTCH BRONZE (Schreiner 1976) L. 38" \$7.50

For the gardener who appreciates the unusual—this expansively lively conglomerate blend is near perfection. Its color spectra ranges from light gold into metallic glossy rich bronze, adorned with a gleaming iridescent gold sparkle. Handsome and broadly ruffled. HM '78. Pictured page 66.

BY NIGHT (Schreiner 1976) M. 38"

Boldly held on a very well branched stem is this sultry ebony shaded blueblack. It is a sonorous deep night blue-black even to the beard. Medium sized, yet ideally placed flowers, are produced by the abundant extra tall stems—a real step forward in darks. HC '74. HM '77. Illustrated page 16.

CULTURE: Spuria and Siberian Iris need a well-drained soil with plenty of compost. Do not let the rhizomes dry out when planted, keep moist in Spring. It is not cessary to water in Summer. Keep freshly set out plants MOIST at all times, plant rhizomes deeper than other Iris-an inch or two of soil over the rhizomes, depending on the texture of soil, do not plant too shallowly. Siberians and Spurias love full sun, the warmer the better.

Do not expect to see new green growth immediately after planting. Both require a second year to become firmly established. Also do not judge bloom on a yearling, unestablished plant. Their bloom is apt to be sparse and not representative. Give winter protection the first winter on relatively unestablished plants. For this purpose we recommend a light covering of hay or leaves late in the Fall. Remove the mulch in early Spring. Once established Siberians and Spurias will remain producing more and more bloom for years. Do not use lime or gypsum in any form. They may be, indeed, should be, left undisturbed for years for maximum beauty. They are trouble free if given these conditions.




Ten Easy Rules to Follow

DEPTH TO PLANT

Place your rhizomes just below the surface of the ground with the roots well spread out BAD underneath so the rhizome is within reach of the warmth of the sun's rays while the roots beneath are in moist (not soggy) soil. Be sure to firm the soil tightly around each rhizome when planting. Follow ordinary good garden practice of watering and settling soil on newly set plants, of course.







Depends on your particular plans. Generally Iris are planted from 8 inches to 2 feet apart. Closer plantings are for immediate effect and will need thinning sooner. Plant three of one kind to give an immediate clump effect in a triangle with the toes of the rhizomes pointing inward. Place 8 inches apart. Plant 2 feet or more apart they may be left for longer periods of time.

WHERE TO PLANT


The ideal location for your Iris is a sunny, well drained position. Sunshine, at a minimum, half day; Iris will not do well in the deep shade. No water should stand in your Iris beds. Raise the beds slightly above the level of your garden paths if necessary.

SHOULD OLD CLUMPS BE THINNED

Yes, after they become crowded, about every four years. Dig up clumps, remove and discard the old center divisions and replant the large new fans with foliage. (1) Thinned clump leaving portion of established clump in original position. You can also thin by taking a sharp knife and cutting out the old rhizome portions as shown in (2). If you do this it is not necessary to take up the whole clump.

WHEN TO PLANT

For best results plant July through September. Early planting establishes the new Iris plants before winter. This is the time to reset clumps of Iris that are crowded, generally clumps 3 to 4 years old. In the extreme heat of the South you may prefer to plant in September, though many regularly plant during the summer months with success.



Grow Tris

for Beautiful Blooms

TO THE BEGINNER

Iris are one of the easiest perennials to grow. They survive with less care and reward you with fine bloom with a minimum of attention. These few suggestions are all simple and proper care is very easy. Treat yourself to some of the finer Iris that have been developed recently.

SOIL PREPARATION

Work your soil well to a depth of 10 to 12 inches. If your soil is heavy, incorporate sand so moisture percolates out quickly. The soil should not be acid. If it is, apply lime, otherwise no lime is recommended.

FERTILIZATION

Iris will thrive without feeding but will respond to fertilization. In the matter of fertilizers, garden sense should be used. A nice garden soil will grow fine Iris. An excessively heavy nitrogenous feeding will give very lush growth which is more susceptible to rot. In the preparation of your new Iris bed, spade in a good application of compost below the roots. Well processed compost is ideal. Then an application of a well balanced fertilizer applied as a top dressing dusted around and in between the plants in the early spring or very late fall is desirable. Steamed bone meal and super-phosphate are fine top dressing materials. The compost furnishes humus and valuable soil organisms. It is easy to overdo Iris fertilizing, but undesirable to omit feeding entirely.

CULTIVATING

Do it shallowly. Iris feeding roots are very near the surface. Keep your Iris free of weeds and do not allow neighboring plants to encroach upon them. Remember, they should have sunlight right down to the rhizome. Remove the outer leaves as they begin to brown. At all times keep litter, old Iris leaves, grasses, etc., away from the rhizomes. Clean cultivation is the finest precaution for Iris troubles.

GENERAL GARDEN CARE

Cultivate shallowly after each rain when the ground has dried sufficiently for proper tilth. As the Iris grow, the outside foliage becomes limp. Remove these outside leaves every so often. Particularly about two weeks after blooming time. Do not trim Iris foliage on established plants except to cut off leaf spot should that show up. Bloom stems are cut level with the ground after blooming on a dry day so the cut heals quickly.

WATERING

Depends on location. Newly set plants need moisture so they can grow a new root system. They appreciate this attention. Water at fairly long intervals in dry weather. Established plants do not require watering except in very arid parts of the country. The common mistake is to give the Iris too much water. At times of excessive heat newly set plants can be shaded by an upright shingle or some such protection cutting off the direct rays of the sun for a few days.
