A tedious task, one that might be shunned by many, was faithfully done year after year. On behalf of our society and for making my work easier, a sincere thank you to Earl for a job superbly done.

The second person to thank is Evelyn Hayes, our treasurer of the past eight years. She has kept our books, sometimes under very trying circumstances, gradually but certainly pointing the way to better record keeping and better handling of society finances. Although she was unable to attend most of our national meetings, she quietly nudged me to work with the board of directors to make possible a clearer accounting by bringing all bill paying to the hands of the treasurer. There are two other bright spots for the society to recognize. Our enthusiastic Southern Regional Director, Judy Earp, designed a form for reporting reblooming records. That was published in the Recorder a year ago. For the first time ever, we have begun to receive organized reports of rebloom from various areas of the country. Those will be tallied and the results published in the next Recorder. Those of you who did not collect data could help us all by keeping records on the form this coming season. The more reports we have, the better the information becomes and the better we can inform our members of rebloom potential for any given cultivar for their gardens.

The final item of good news revolved around publishing a revised Checklist of Reblooming Irises. We now have aboard Ken Roberts who has much of the information and mountains of new data being incorporated in a data base for eventual publishing. The checklist has been out of print for three years and much new information has been accumulated. That should be ready for publication some time this year through Ken's efforts, a bonanza for Iris gardeners and for hybridizers of reblooming irises.

GARDEN NOTES FOR 95

These are notes about reblooming iris I saw at the Aitken's Salmon Creek Garden near Portland, OR. I visited the garden twice on Aug. 12 and a second time on September 2nd.

I will start with naming my favorite. It was PURE AS GOLD (Maryott 93). It is a bright deep yellow self. The flowers have a modern round, ruffled, flaring form. I counted 9 buds on a stem. The foliage was clean and the stalk was upright. When I visited in August, there was at least 1 flower stalk in each first year clump, and each clump had increase. When I revisited the Aitken's garden in September, PURE AS GOLD was still blooming. I checked for increase again. There was 1 to 4 increase per clump. This plant won an HM this year.

Last year I gloated over CANTINA (Byers 90). It did not bloom, but it has three increase. I kept wandering out to see if it has started any fall flower stalks. CANTINA was in bloom at the Aitkin's in August. It has 9 nicely spaced buds, with purple standards and purple falls edged in with a

darker shade. Some of the plants were blooming out, but I'm not sure if it was due to the removal of increase to fill the Aitkin's' commercial orders.

A few other TB's caught my eye because of their color and form, or because the plants stood out from a distance. SOLSTICE (Weiler 92) is a sky blue flower with white beards and 8 buds. It's form was wide and ruffled. I must admit that sky blue is a favorite color. ROSALIE FIGGIE (McNew 93) is grape colored with white spots around the beard. It had 9 well spaced buds on the stalk. AUTUMN TRYST (Weiler 93) is a plicata consisting of violet on a white background. It was very ruffled with 10 buds. CHATTER (Ghio 93) was not registered as a rebloomer, and it only had one stalk in bloom, but its color stood out. It has a melon peach background with a fuchsia edge. There were also reliable favorites in bloom. These included IMMORTALITY (Zurbrigg 82), ETERNAL BLISS (Byers 88), CORAL CHARMER (H. Wright 83), and DUKE OF EARL (Byers 87)

In August there were two IB's in the Median guest beds with rebloom. One was A119A, an IB seedling from Paul Black. It had 2 stalks. One stalk had 10 buds. The standards were yellow. The falls were yellow with brown dots, and the beard was orange. The other IB was 63-84-1-B from Boswell. It had 1 stalk that was about to bloom with deep red purple buds. Unfortunately, the flower opened after I left.

I saw some unexpected bloom in the Aitken garden. IRIS LAEVIGATAE SEPERFLORENS was in bloom in August. There were several plants blooming, so this was not an isolated single flower. The flower has three purple falls with a blue flash down the center of the petal. The standards are very small and also purple. This is a water iris, but it grows out of the water in regular garden soil at the Aitken's.

I also saw two MTB's in bloom during my September visit. LADY DI (Varner 89) was in bloom. There were 2 out of ten plants blooming. It was a blue violet flower with white around the beard. It's breeding is TOM TIT x (DRADY X I. REGINAE). The second MTB I saw in bloom was a Fisher seedling number. 94-4. The standards have a cream background with a light brownish purple spot. The falls have a white background

with purple specks and a light brown edge. The beard is yellow and the stem had 7 to 9 buds.

As I stated last year, these comments are based on weekend visits, so I did not observe the plants over the season. The Aitken's garden is a commercial garden where most of the bearded iris are dug and replanted each year. Sunset has developed a set of climate zones for the West Coast. I live in Seattle where the Sunset zone is 5. The Aitken's live in Vancouver, WA where the Sunset zone is 6. My spring bloom seems to lag behind the Aitken's about a week, but the fall bloom lags by a month. ETERNAL BLISS was in bloom at the Aitken's house in August, but it was September when my clump began to bloom.

It's mid-September. The bearded iris can rebloom for another month or two, and I look forward to see a few more flowers in my garden. The Aitken's replant their commercial beds in September; so I'll have to wait until spring before I can look at blooms of introduced varieties in their yard.

OFF SEASON BLOOM REPORT 1995

This is the 1995 version of my annual off-season bloom report from Southern California. Some varieties new to this garden have shown off-season bloom, as have traditional favorites. Other traditional favorites have been removed from the gardens due to space limitations. Increasing numbers of seedlings in a limited space have forced some tough decisions. Time limitations due to gainful employment have also curtailed my activities. 1996 may be the time to retire from my job and sell my home in favor of some place with more room.

The report is the result of a simple listing of the irises in bloom in my garden during the two or three times a month I grab my list and add to it. Irises in bloom at the end of one month and into the next month are thus listed in both months.

I consider normal spring bloom to begin on March 1 and end on June 15. In the case of late June bloom, I count a clone as showing off-season bloom only if it has already bloomed once earlier in the spring bloom season. Otherwise it is simply a late spring bloomer, and I do not count it. A very hot August left many clones dormant until the weather cooled in October.

Each year I have selected an iris or two for mention as an outstanding iris. This year it has to be SUNNY DISPOSITION. This excellent iris has been in bloom during four months and its winter stalks are nearly identical in quality to its spring stalks. The branching is great, the flowers are attractive, and the height of the off-season stalks is nearly equivalent to the spring height, which is not true of many off-season bloomers. SUNNY DISPOSITION has to be one of the more impressive newer iris I am now growing.

FLORENCE WHEAT

I am enclosing my records of what reblooming irises that performed for me. Most of them did not rebloom, but the ones that did ALL had snaky stalks and they were in different areas of the yard. Would it be possible to have an article on what causes this? The spring bloom was okay.

RED REVIVAL 10/95, JENNIFER REBECCA 9/95 very floriferous, SPEED LIMIT 9/95 very floriferous, REINCARNATION 9/95 rebloom first year planted.

KENNETH MELLON

I'm located up here in northern New York and there has been weeks of no rain during this past summer, but in spite of lack of water, my seedlings have produced very large clumps. I had a good percentage of first bloom on my seedlings during regular bloom season.

Have had rebloom on Monty Byer's "BUCK-WHEAT" during July and August and as of September 12, QUEEN DOROTHY and SUGAR BLUES are reblooming along with seedlings. Most of my parent stock have been replanted and have produced large clumps during the summer. I'm expecting my garden to have quite a display next spring.

Several societies have sent reports to her from Region 17; which includes zones, months, and varietal information. Judi sent request to all the RVP's in the Southern District for information.

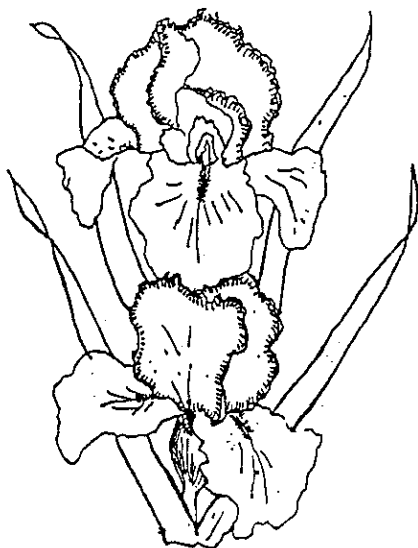
Eastern - Clarence Mahan -

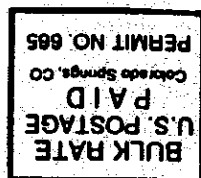
