### Jane McKnew

Jane McKnew died on April 25, 1998, after a short illness. She had been a member of FSK for many years, although not many of her fellow members knew her well. She is better known nationally and internationally through her irises than she is locally. She was an outstanding hybridizer and surprised everyone with her eye-catching show entries in the seedling classes. One of her registered irises (Io) has been lost, but the other was introduced by Dr. John Weiler of Rialto Gardens in California. She named it after FSK's Rosalie Figge, and it is available through many commercial catalogues.

Jane's irises were her hobby, but she also had a 20-plus year career as a social worker. A very intelligent person with several degrees in her chosen field, she dealt with people in all walks of life and was highly respected by her clients, even though she was involved in such difficult areas as child protection.

At times Jane seemed exuberant and impetuous, but those who knew her well realized that this was a defense used by those who are shy. A very kindhearted and sensitive person, she was extremely loyal toward her friends, and those of us who were her friends will have fond memories of her. Her life was much too short, she was only in her mid 50's and the world has lost a talented hybridizer. She is survived by her husband, Ronald Bacon.

The following poem on the card given at her funeral expresses Jane's attitude very well:

#### Do Not Stand By My Grave and Weep

I am not there, I do not sleep.
I am a thousand winds that blow;
I am the diamond glint on snow.
I am the gentle autumn rain.
When you awaken in the morning hush, I am the swift uplifting rush of quiet birds encircling flight.

#### The President's Message

Dear Fellow-Rebloomer-Enthusiasts:

The BEST piece of news announced at the annual meeting in Denver was that the new REBLOOMING CHECKLIST was available at the meeting and we sold 100 copies there. By mail it will cost \$13 for the U.S., and \$16 for overseas (and that includes priority mail which is just as economical for this weight as regular The CHECKLIST HAS EXPANDED FROM JUST OVER 1900 NAMES TO OVER 2250 CULTIVARS. Not only are the states (and countries) given where rebloom occurs, but also the USDA zones. This means you can use your knowledge of your climate to assist in ordering irises that will have the greatest potential to really rebloom for you. EVERYONE will find it useful, whether you are a hybridizer or a backyard grower. For this reason, all who order irises and expect them to rebloom in their area should FIRST check the list to ascertain that they have been reported to rebloom in that area.

ALSO all hybridizers who sell irises as rebloomers should indicate in what areas the Our former rebloom has been reported. president, Dr. Weiler, was most particular to indicate this in his catalog. Not to do so is a disservice to the hybridizer, the seller, and the buyer. If the iris does not rebloom, then it reflects unfavorably on the seller and also on those of us who are trying to promote rebloomers. Irises that rebloom on the West Coast do not necessarily rebloom in all other parts of the country. (In fact, not even all "oncers" do that - I have a collection of Dykes and it is discouraging and expensive to keep reordering certain Dykes that do not survive here in the East - that is why Vanity is my favorite.) But that is another soapbox issue: that the Dykes should be able to grow just about everywhere.

Let me confess what happened to me 40 some years ago in my ignorance and enthusiasm! I remembered how excited my mother had been when she came home from her garden club with a YELLOW iris - and I had received a colorful catalogue with pictures of irises that rebloomed in January. I thought how wonderful that would be, after all, why not enjoy them the year around! That January (don't forget I was very ignorant, and very unscientific, but also very enthusiastic) well, my husband, who was a scientist, found me digging in the SNOW! He asked what I was doing, and I was very embarrassed but admitted I was looking for irises. He, the dear man,

sensitive to my embarrassment and knowing my love for irises, gently explained that the catalogue came from California where everything could grow all year - and I, in my enthusiasm, had not read it thoroughly and, wanting to surprise him, had not revealed my hopes when ordering! Now that I have bared my soul, you see why it is so important that anyone ordering irises should have at least a smidgeon of faith that what they are ordering may possibly rebloom for them. No one can give an unqualified guarantee. A lot depends on the soil, the care given, where planted, etc. Rebloomers do take extra care. They need to be fertilized and watered more than the oncers, after all they give you more bloom and need more nourishment for the stamina required. That is just logical. It is also logical that there needs to be genes there to help along. So the message here is: Be sure to order The CHECKLIST - and order it from Charlie Brown, please. He is Membership Chairman and is handling the CHECKLIST.

We accomplished many things together at the annual meeting in Denver. We divided the Eastern Region into the Northeast and the East, in order to coordinate the climates more equitably. The Northeast Director will receive input from Regions: 1 (all New England); 2 (New York state); and 16 (Canada). We need to encourage more people to grow and hybridize the rebloomers in this area. After all, our Lloyd Zurbrigg began his reblooming interest in Canada, and one of our outstanding pioneer rebloomer hybridizers, G. Percy Brown, was from Region 1.

Also, at the Denver meeting Larry Doucette was unanimously voted to be the Northeast Director. At the Spring meeting in Oklahoma (May 1999), we will need to change the "four" to "five" in the bylaws, Article V, Section 3, so it will read, "There shall be five Directors to represent five geographic areas..."

The terms of both the Northeast and the Eastern Directors will coincide. Mike Lowe finishes his term as Eastern Director in May, and Joan Roberts' nomination for that post will be voted on in May. The Eastern Director will now be able to operate more efficiently, because that territory, including Regions 3, 4, 7, & 19, is more homogenous.

Thanks go to the Nominating Committee – Jim Ennenga (Chairman), Florence Wheat, and Mike Lowe – for an excellent job, and I am particularly grateful to Ginny Spoon for her very efficient editing and publishing of four issues of the *RECORDER*. Because Ginny said she would not be available for the next issue, the Spring issue, I have enlisted the help of Kathy Guest, who ably edited one issue in 1996. I hope to see you all in Oklahoma in May of '99.

### Board Meeting of the Reblooming Iris Society June 2, 1998, Denver, CO

RIS President, Rosalie Figge called our board meeting to order on June 2, 1998 in Denver, Colorado.

Board Members attending introduced themselves: Charlie Brown, Florence Wheat, Ginny Spoon, Barbara Aitken, Dr. John Weiler, and Claire Honkanen. Mary Brown, parliamentarian, a friend, was also introduced.

Since the minutes had been recorded in the fall (1997) Recorder, a motion was made to dispense with their reading at this time.

Treasurer, Florence Wheat, presented a complete report announcing account balance of \$4,477.95. A complete report is on file.

Rosalie then presented her yearly report. She expressed extreme regret in losing two faithful directors who have resigned. Judith Earp and Opal Wulf. Rosalie appointed the following to fill the unexpired terms until an election. Everett Lineberger as Southern Director, and Larry Harder as Midwest Director. She mentioned a need for a director in the northeastern part of the U.S. to encourage the growth of rebloomers in this area. With this in mind she appointed Lawrence L. #### THE GREAT CLARENCE MYSTERY

Many, including myself, consider Clarence (Zurbrigg 91) HM '95 and AM '97 to be the most beautiful rebloomer ever introduced. Clarence is a multiple rebloomer in zone 9, and reblooms reliably in late summer and fall in zones 4 through 8. Each flower is a dreamy confection that seems to glow from its lighter center like a luminous break in the sky. Its true color is somewhere between the 1998 catalog photograph by Schreiner's (p. 68, described as a "light blue amoena") that is too blue, and Cooley's (p. 30) that is too purple. (The new Kodak Gold ® film gives nearly true blue as well as good purple reproduction.) Like other irises, its color can vary with time of year, soil conditions, and climate. I like Cooley's accurate description, "Bright, shining and gentle describe this noble flower with its bluish white standards crowned violet-blue at the tip. The falls are a light blue-violet with white centers and hafts. Creamy white beards. A moderate sweet fragrance and dependable fall rebloom." (Clarence was one of the ten irises in Cooley's 1998 rebloomer collection that sold out early.) The plant is exceptionally vigorous with rapid increase and healthy blue-green foliage. It is proving to be an excellent pod parent, though as a pollen parent it may be somewhat challenging. Members of our C & P Iris Society have gotten seven or more blooms with double sockets on stalks that reach 35 to 36 inches tall. But Clarence, the iris, faces two unanswered questions that I will try to clarify: What is it and what are its parents? Like a few other great bearded irises, such as Stepping Out and Dusky Challenger, the parentage of Clarence was given by its hybridizer, Dr. Lloyd Zurbrigg, as unknown. Answering the first question may help answer the second.

Genetics Review: The plicata locus only affects the water soluble anthocyanin pigment distribution and not the lipid soluble yellow xanthophylls and yellow (carotenes) and pink (lycopene) carotenoid pigments. (White is the absence of pigments created by the defraction of light by the living cytoplasm in the tiny conical cuticle surfaces similar to the whiteness of diamonds that is a combination of many rainbow, prismatic spectrums. A dead, frozen flower loses its whiteness created by the cuticle surface cones when its internal, cellular structure is destroyed.) In their anthocyanin pigment distribution plicata and luminata, like a negative and its print, are the reverse of one another. Plicatas, such as Stepping Out, have pigment around the edge of the petals that are unpigmented in the center; in the hafts and style arms; and stitching or dotting lying over the veins. Luminatas, such as Mind Reader, have no pigment around the edge of the petals that are pigmented in the center, yet unpigmented around the beard, in the hafts, and the veins. Interestingly, luminatas can have anthocyanin pigmentation in the style arms. The dominant PI pattern has full anthocyanin pigmentation with no pattern, basically a self like Dusky Challenger. Glaciatas (formerly called ices) lack all anthocyanin pigment and can be white, yellow, golden, orange or pink as in Answered Prayers. The color of the beards is determined by interactions with these alleles at the plicata locus, yet mainly by other genes and gene modifiers.

To my eye Clarence looked somewhat like a luminata so I crossed it on several of Keith Keppel's beautiful luminatas. Only with Clarence X Mind Reader did I get seedlings with very vigorous rebloomer-like growth and tall (some up to 38 inches) early May stalks with nice flowers. Most were various luminata amoenas, but one seedling was a perfect glaciata with no purple, blue, maroon or red anthocyanin pigments and faint yellow at the base of the falls. To yield such a glaciata, both parents must have two glaciata alleles (unique trait doses) at the plicata locus (gene's linear position on a specific chromosome). Then, to my great surprise, the best seedling was very dark violet with white beards, and when back lighted, was obviously a luminata and only slightly bitone. The morning Ginny and I saw its first flower open we were overjoyed! This fall, three of

the largest rhizomes, reset only two months earlier, began to develop rebloom stalks, though too late to beat an early hard freeze. We registered this seedling (96-252A) as Daughter of Stars. This means that both parents of Daughter of Stars also had to have two luminata alleles at the plicata locus. So Clarence and Mind Reader at the plicata locus are all recessive and pl lu pl lu pl gl pl gl and both are luminata-glaciatas. (The World of Irises uses pl a - all white - for the glaciata allele, but I prefer pl gl) Keith Keppel in a recent letter relates that he has obtained luminatas and a glaciata from crosses of Flights of Fancy X Fancy Women. I believe this means that both of them are luminata-glaciatas like Clarence and Mind Reader. Possibly the two luminata alleles and the two glaciata alleles were introduced from different species and still always pair as in amphidiploids instead of randomly assorting during meiosis. (The Pl dominant allele at the plicata locus produces no plicata pattern. It needs to be present in only one allele of the four to obliterate and hide the expression of the plicata and luminata as well as the glaciata recessive alleles at the plicata locus. The plicata and the luminata alleles override the expression of the glaciata allele, however when plicata and luminata occur together they are both expressed creating fancies.)

An amoena can be recessive (all four alleles in tetraploids with four sets of chromosomes must be recessive to be expressed) or dominant as in Paul Cook's Whole Cloth or Charlie Nearpass's Dover Beach. The dominant amoena pattern designated Is can have a dosage effect: Is is is a slight bitone, Is Is is a medium bitone, Is Is is with lightly pigmented standards and darker falls, and Is Is Is white standards and pigmented falls. (Modifier genes can also influence the amoena pattern that can occur as a narrow pigmented band around the falls as in Emma Cook.) Probably three alleles dominant for the amoena pattern are required to have the light blue violet pigment in the standards as in Clarence. This is like superimposing the luminata pattern modified by the glaciata influence on a high dosage dominant amoena like Proud Tradition. So, what is Clarence? I believe Clarence is a luminata-glaciata high dosage amoena!

Of all of Lloyd's introductions, Latest Style looks most like Clarence, as suggested to Lloyd and me by Clarence Mahan. As I wrote this, Latest Style was reblooming in our garden. It has lavender-white standards with some light violet at the bases, the lavender-white style arms have light violet bands down their centers, falls light violet with considerable darkening to violet in the center and in the veins, and light violet around the creamy white beards that are light yellow in the throat. Latest Style, 34" tall and sibling to Lightly Seasoned, is (((Crinkled Ivory X Autumn Sensation) X Grand Baroque) X Goliath's Mate) X Dawn Violet. It is ruffled, flaring, and of modern form. Autumn Sensation is a recessive amoena and Crinkled Ivory is a light creamy yellow self while the other three parents are all dominant amoenas. During a recent phone conversation Lloyd told me that the reason he registered Clarence as 'parentage unknown' was that several of the crosses that year had their identifying tags become unreadable.

If Latest Style was one of the parents, could we deduce what the other parent was. I crossed two off-white siblings out of I Do X Laced Cotton, (As related by Keith Keppel, Laced Cotton is a 'minimalist' plicata with barely visible plicata markings at the base of the petals. It has been shown by test crosses with plicatas to produce plicatas showing it has at least two plicata alleles, maybe four, or various possible assortments of luminata and glaciata alleles at the plicata locus). All six seedlings from this cross were fancies (luminata-plicatas) implying that I Do has two - or more - luminata alleles at the plicata locus. I also have a clean light yellow ground luminata amoena seedling with yellow standards and style arms and darker yellow beards with lavender, plum, and purple coloring between the yellow veins and edges of the falls. It is registered as Dreaming Rainbows. This yellow ground luminata amoena came out of a cross of two reblooming yellow selfs Corn Harvest X Delia's Child (( Lemon Mist X Fall Primrose)X

Corn Harvest), making its chromosomes 3/4ths from Corn Harvest. The dominant 'white' pattern designated the I locus that makes irises solid white, yellow, orange or pink does not completely eliminate the anthocyanin that can be seen expressed at the bases of the falls. (The I locus is a different locus from the amoena pattern Is.) In Glaciatas, no such purple, blue, maroon or red markings occur. This means that a yellow iris like Corn Harvest could be carrying unexpressed plicata, luminata, or glaciata alleles. Even with four different alleles at the plicata locus PI (dominant, no pattern) pI (recessive, plicata) pI lu (luminata) pI gI (glaciata), just one dominant 'white' allele (one dose of a possible four, Iiii) would prevent all anthocyanin expression except at the bases of the falls. Likewise, I Do could have two unexpressed luminata alleles at the plicata locus as indicated by my test crosses. This could also be true for the offspring of I Do including Immortality. Immortality, that can reach 35" tall, is a more likely parent of Clarence at 35" tall, than the shorter I Do at 32"tall. Also, the rebloom characteristics of Clarence are more like Immortality. However, Lloyd has no record of such a cross of Latest Style and Immortality. Lloyd was so kind to search his records for me of all the pertinent Latest Style crosses. In all these nine crosses except one, Latest Style was used as the pollen parent, once on Brook Flower or on seedlings no longer available. The exception is the cross, Q 194 -Latest Style X unknown, 52 seeds. Thus, the parentage of Clarence still remains a mystery.

Even though we only have a candidate for one of its two parents, we do know that Clarence is a truly gorgeous reblooming iris that could have the potential to create luminatas, fancies (luminataplicatas), and glaciatas that are reliable rebloomers like the reblooming plicatas (such as Autumn Circus and Earl of Essex) we have learned to love. Hybridizers, young and older, novices and experts, "Start your tweezers!"

#### THE LURE OF THE SPACE AGE

For years I have devoted my hybridizing to the search for reblooming irises for the Eastern half of the nation. The search had overtones of almost religious severity.

Since coming to North Carolina, it has been harder to get rebloom, and my goal has shifted to trying for Space Age irises that rebloom, a sort of double jeopardy. But I have been much more light-hearted about it. I realize that not everyone will want irises with added spoons or flounces, yet I find them fascinating, and doubt that we have yet seen all that they may offer.

The originator of these so-called Space Age irises was the late Lloyd Austin of Placerville, California. He noted little "bumps" at the end of the beards of some plicatas in the Sydney Mitchell garden, and by selective breeding, managed to magnify these into horns, spoons and flounces. These were introduced to commerce, but found little favor with AIS judges.

The late Monty Byers of Potter Valley, California, with his friend, Bill Gibbs, grew up to 35,000 seedlings a year, many of them Space Agers. Sky Hooks (RE-9), from Manley Osborne, was the primal parent for these lines. Monty wrote an annual catalogue that fascinated many readers, and turned some of them into ardent fans. As a result, both the Space Age and the remontant irises became much more popular. (Note that the last two Dykes Medals for 1997 and 1998 went to Space Age irises, Thornbird and Conjuration, hybridized by Monty Byers.)

In 1989, I tried Hands Up, Mauvelous and Potion in my crosses up in Virginia. In 1990, I used Conjuration, Good Fairy (RE-7&8), and Godsend. In 1992, in the new garden here in Durham, NC I used Mesmerizer (RE-7&8) and Rock Star (RE-8&9). The cross of Renown (RE-4-9) and Mesmerizer has been the most successful to date, in respect to getting fully hardy seedlings with Space Ager appendages, even though remontancy has not yet appeared. 00 26, Northward Ho (RE-4-9) X Rock Star, has been especially exciting for color, though I have found that when crossed to other varieties descended by Gigolo (RE-Australia), the next generation has always had poor growth quality accompanying the vivid color.

**Pinkness** (RE-5-9) X **Godsend** has not shown as much quality, but has given some good color in fairly good flowers. I am anxious to see how these will do when crossed to the **Renown** X **Mesmerizer** cross. The NN 32 cross, KK 130 "Flying" X **Godsend**, has given some wonderful things, with two scheduled for introduction. The KK 130 seedling is interesting in that **Anne Boleyn** appears as a grandparent twice. (**Anne Boleyn** is a creamy yellow with huge, spreading flounces close to each fall). The two NN 32 seedlings for introduction are NN 32-9-2, an orchidpink with red beards that turn bright purple at the end, and NN 32 "Last", a border bearded apricot with big self-colored flounces that turn upward gracefully. "Last", is indeed, one of the last irises to bloom.

When Region 4 came to visit in the fall of 1996, the judges waxed enthusiastic over seedling PP 98, a border bearded, violet with a much deeper heart and beard and horn. The pod parent was a violet-blue with brown beards, and the pollen parent a pale blue with deep blue beards, having **Howdy Do** (RE-9) twice in its parentage. PP 98 did not bloom this spring, but is growing nicely. I am hoping that it will hold its border bearded character on its second blooming. The judges called me over to comment on it, but they saw it before I did, as it had just opened!

Fewer crosses have been made among the medians, but I do have a white SDB with blue hearts, that has long white spoons. It comes from my TB Space Age introduction **Margaret Helen**, pictured on the inside cover of the January 1997 AIS Bulletin. The pollen used came from Lynda and Roger Miller of Indiana, being their seedling #1687. Like almost all from this cross, 00 70-2-3 has no pollen, but it sets pods every year. Its "cousin", 00 82 Blue, has lots of pollen and derives from the same Miller seedling #1687.

Some fairly recent seedlings of interest may be mentioned here, for the sake of those who are enthusiastic about the Space Agers.

OO 32B-EEE is a pink that blooms with the SDB's, but on rather tall well-branched stalks. (Pinkness X Godsend).

OO 32C-1 is an apricot-orange with good form and short horns.

OO 74A-7-2 is a white with self-colored flounces, red beards, and a row of little blue markings across the very top of the haft! (KK 130 "Flying" X Godsend).

QQ 43 VIVID, has vivid red-violet markings on a yellow background, and very dark-colored stalks. (OO 26-3-4 X OO 26-5-2). OO 26 is (Northward Ho X Rock Star).

OO 33C-6-1 lovely neglecta with beautiful big spoons.

OO 33-4-1 a tall, well-formed pinky-violet amoena with horns. Both seedlings, this amoena and the above neglecta, are from **Renown** X **Mesmerizer**.

MM 6 flounced amoena with great color. (KK 14-8-3 X Conjuration).

<u>Caribbean Ahov</u> is a great yellow with bright violet appendages. The branching and number of buds is particularly impressive. This came from a seedling of Fred Stephenson in Roanoke, which had the distinction of winning Best Seedling twice in the Blue Ridge shows. It is derived from **Song of Norway** X **Miss Jupiter**. Pollen parent of **Caribbean Ahov** is unknown.

A few further comments on the seedlings of this spring, 1998.

<u>RR 55-4-3</u> is a lavender-violet with huge flounces, blooming on tall, well-branched stalks. At the end of each flounce there is a flat "plate" or "dish", and this is orange! Parentage: yellow seedling of **Spoon Time** X NN 32-10-3.

PP 57 was a very good pink with long horns. (NN 32-6-2 X Pink Attraction RE-4-10).

<u>PP 56</u> was dubbed "White Perfection", and was the very last bearded iris to bloom. From NN 32-2-3 X **Mesmerizer**, it resembles its pollen parent, but the red beards are quite visible.

<u>RR 44-1-1</u> perhaps should not be included as it bore no branches, but the lovely yellow flowers with huge yellow flounces were very memorable. Hopefully it will branch next year.

(NN 32-10-3 X OO 23-1-4, a Mesmerizer seedling).

RR 28 R O was a deep, rich orange with no markings. The solid haft seemed the more remarkable, coming from a plicata. (LL 89D-1-2 X Rock Star RE-8&9). The pod parent is an apricot-pink from (Lady Friend RE-7&9 X Beverly Sills RE-7-9) X (Fresno Frolic RE-9 X Mabel Andrews RE-6-9).

QQ 248 Amoena had only a dwarfed stalk on its first-year plant, but set two good pods, and had fertile pollen. It is an orchid amoena with very long beards that are orange at the haft, but blue-tinted down the fall. (MM 24-2-3 X OO 33-4-1).

1998 was a good spring season here, without a serious frost, and with sufficient rain, but not too much. We look forward to having Region 4 here again in late October of 1999, although the Space Agers will not be in bloom, unless some decide to favor you with a curtain call.

### AIS AWARDS TO REBLOOMING IRISES, 1998

Below are listed award winning cultivars for the year which have been reported to rebloom. Except where noted, the rebloom reports are taken directly from the 1998 Cumulative Checklist of Reblooming Iris. USDA hardiness zones where rebloom has occurred are reported. Irises which have been in commerce for a short period or those with limited geographic distribution may eventually accumulate a more extensive rebloom record. Some, however, may continue to rebloom only in areas where the growing season is longest. If you are adding reblooming cultivars with a known performance record to your garden next year, these will be good choices for your climate zone.

### Jane McKnew's Great Reblooming Tall Bearded Iris, Rosalie Figge (1993)

It was a true stroke of genius when Jane McKnew placed pollen from Violet Miracle on a flower of Titan's Glory. Titan's Glory is one of the most deserving and vigorous of all the Dykes medal winners. It is a deep violet self, totally of one color, with impeccable form and exceptionally well branched, sturdy stalks. Titan's Glory has never been known to rebloom, but has many of the best traits of rebloomers, such as rapid increase and resistance to rot. Jane used one of the best deep violet rebloomers, Violet Miracle, as the pollen parent. It reblooms reliably from zones 5 to 9, though usually reblooming later in the fall. Surprisingly, this cross produced Rosalie Figge with even better rebloom traits (zones 4-10), being a nearly continuous rebloomer in frost free zones. Growing in our garden (zone 6b) without extra summer watering and fertilizer, a clump not only started reblooming in late summer and continued into fall but put up a magnificent 39" stalk with eleven buds and four perfect blossoms open at once. We have a slide of that lovely stalk. Jane listed Rosalie Figge as M, for mid-season, but in our garden it is one of the first TBs to bloom in the spring.

Jane describes **Rosalie Figge** as a slight bitone with the standards (RHS 86B, violet) and the falls (86A). She recognized the styles as even lighter (86C) but with a dark (86A) midline streak. The beard hairs are white at the bases yet tipped violet (86C) becoming yellow in the throat. There is a beautiful white spray around the beard that adds a sense of majesty like a queen's lace collar. The fragrance is pleasantly sweet. With Jane's excellent description this very distinctive iris can be readily identified for decades to come. When the flower first opens the falls are flared and arched and the ruffling is dynamic. The standards are closed with grand French curves in the midribs. By the second day the ruffled falls spread and unfurl like a Victorian gown to display a maximum of its violet color. The drawing on the cover of this issue was taken from a photograph of such a two day old flower. It shows a form that is impressively wide and modern in every respect. The texture is like exquisite velvet with light diamond dusting. The violet color has vibrant undertones of rose. I am deeply grateful to Jane McKnew for her gift to Irisdom. When I met Jane several years ago I had the pleasure of personally thanking her for hybridizing this beautiful iris. And what a wonderful and fitting tribute Jane made to her FSK friend and its namesake, our President.

### Rebloom Highlights for '98 by Ginny Spoon, VA zone 6

Since our collection is large, and listing all of the rebloomers that rebloomed would be extensive, I thought that touching upon the highlights of the year would be more interesting. Our season in northern Virginia was unusually dry after a very wet spring. We had about 35 inches of rainfall for the year but unfortunately, most of it fell before mid-May. Our drought was so severe that several areas of Virginia are asking for disaster relief. Finally, we are getting some rainfall now in December.

We were amazed at the number of irises that rebloomed in spite of the dry weather, about 200 from our collection of 700 plus about 50 seedlings. Don did a great job of irrigating considering that we depend upon our well for water. When it got close to rebloom season he decided to concentrate his watering on a few of the warmer zone rebloomers. Since he loves SDB TuTu Turquoise (by Paul Black) so much, he started giving it some extra water (almost daily) about mid-August. It rewarded us with massive rebloom on both clumps in the yard just before our first freeze in the first week of November. Forever Blue (Chuck Chapman 97), a delightful little vibrant blue SDB, rebloomed numerous times for us throughout the summer. A big surprise was Canary Delight (Roberts 97) which sent up an impressive rebloom stalk, and would have opened but for our two days of 21 degrees in early November. Joan Roberts was delighted with the news since its siblings had rebloomed, and Canary Delight had not yet rebloomed for anyone. Sweet Solitude (Nearpass R. 96) was another rebloomer that did not beat the freeze. It will probably be best enjoyed in a slightly warmer zone than ours (zone 7 and warmer), but the spring bloom is so beautiful that we would grow it even if it didn't rebloom. This wonderful white flower with the violet-blue rim around the falls and tangerine beards was hybridized by the late Dr. Charlie Nearpass. We are all looking forward to its introduction by Friendship Gardens.

The late summer top performers were Champagne Elegance (Niswonger 87) and Silver Dividends (Zurbrigg 91). BB Leah Traded (Bernice Miller 90) produced a glorious clump which rebloomed for almost three months. Other irises that put on a real show were Violet Music (Mahan 90) and Autumn Tryst

(Weiler 93). Another favorite for its beautiful glowing orange color was SDB **Autumn Maple** (Weiler 92).

Our first reblooming show of the year was the Region IV meeting in Charlotte, NC held on Saturday, October 10th. The Queen of Show was Harvest of Memories (Zurbrigg 85) exhibited by Phyllis Soine. Our next reblooming show was our own C&P show held at Behnke's Garden Center in Beltsville, MD on the next Saturday, October 17th. I won the Queen of Show with George Sutton's beautifully ruffled Golden Immortal (97) which had well-branched stalks with two open flowers and another just opening. The first runner-up was Don's Faithful and True (Spoon 97). The next Saturday had yet another reblooming show to attend, the FSK Iris Society Show in Towson, MD. I won Queen of Show with the most beautiful stalk that I have ever exhibited. It had four open flowers, but I had to cut off the bottom branch to make it in proportion to the vase, and it still had three newly opened flowers. It was Forever Yours (Hager 92). A great stalk of Violet Music (Mahan 91) was the first runner-up.

Frances Iva (Zurbrigg 90) sent up a rebloom stalk the first time for us in November, but was frozen just before it opened. Autumn Clouds (Hager 90) was another one that rebloomed for us for the first time (late October). It was so lovely that we could hardly take our eyes off the tall commanding stalk graced full of pale blue flowers with exquisite ruffling when we were outside. Forever Gold (Sutton 97) is now trying to rebloom since we have had a short return of mild weather extending into December. SDB's Baby Blessed (Zurbrigg 79) and Mini Might (Weiler 92) are also reblooming now.


