Dawn of the Reblooming Era, President's Message By Ken Roberts

Lloyd Zurbrigg was dedicated to creating rebloomers and has been credited by many with

popularizing the age of rebloomers. At the time of its introduction, his 'Immortality' was a major advancement in the form of remontant

irises and it still lives up to its name. However, there were several other hybridizers also concentrating on developing rebloomers. Monty Byers was an avid promoter of them and I believe it was Ben Hager who said. "rebloomers are the ins of the future". Well folks the future is now here.

For those who attended the Reblooming

Section meeting in the learn George Sutton confirms to rebloomers has arrived. At one to sught that rebloomers were an odd to represent the case as I have seen better to longer the case as I have seen better to lonductions and in a number of seeding. This includes cultivars that rebloom reliable to the east coast. Indeed, I have seen rebloomers that surpass some currently introduced "one state".

On page 143 of the 2007 Handbook for Judges and Show Officials under the title Garden Judging, it states, "The ability of an iris to rebloom should always be considered an outstanding characteristic". Under the title Exhibition Judging, you will see "To be fair, judge the quality of a reblooming iris as you would a non-reblooming iris. Reblooming iris should

be of the same quality as a once-blooming iris." As I just mentioned, I have some rebloomers that are superior to once-bloomers so we should see reblooming irises as Queen of Show more often. OK hybridizers, let's see more of them! Now they can compete evenly with all irises in the same category.

Yes, rebloomers are no longer the iris of the future. Landscape contractors and garden designers are searching for them because they offer an extended bloom season. We need to educate them that although 'Immortality' was the star of the past, there are many dozens that now exceed it in color and form. We salute the hybridizers

who are now concentrating on developing the reblooming iris. And the irises are not all tall bearded, either.

By now you may have noticed that we have printed this publication in color. This is an expensive undertaking and we would like some assistance in a couple of ways. Most importantly is the renewal of all memberships and recruiting new members. In addition, we welcome contributions to the Recorder fund to offset the additional cost.

In order to make the publication even more valuable, it is imperative that reports of rebloom are sent to your Regional Director. This will aid the Editor of the Reblooming Checklist in keeping it current. Thus, in turn, making it more valuable for those interested in selecting rebloomers for their climate.


Board Meeting Minutes By Dana Brown, Secretary

The meeting was called to order by President Barbara Aitken at 7:06 p.m.

The minutes of the previous board meeting and membership meeting were approved as published.

The slate of officers as presented by the Nominating Committee was changed to list Ken Roberts for the office of President. Sterling Innerst, who had previously accepted the nomination, requested his name be withdrawn from nomination due to poor health. The amended slate of officers now reads:

President - Ken Roberts Vice President - Jim Hedgecock Secretary - Dana Brown Treasurer - Rita Gormley Midwestern Director - Tim Stanek



Margaret Sutton presented the treasurer's report. The additional costs for printing an all-color

Reblooming Iris Recorder were discussed. The all-color version with 4 extra pages cost approximately \$1500 more to print than the 2007 black and white version. Editor Carole Buchheim raised \$1480.00 from clubs and individuals to defray the cost for this issue. The individual copy cost is \$6.70 each.

The balance on hand is \$14,475.21. Dave Silverberg moved and Charlie Brown seconded the motion to accept the treasurer's report as presented. Motion carried.

We will no longer require two signatures on checks over \$100. As there is no bylaw requiring this and no amendment is required. It was noted that the bylaws are available on the RIS website.

OLD BUSINESS

2008 Checklists will be delivered tomorrow. There are 150 copies of the checklist and 30 of the CD's. The books will be \$15.00 and the CD will be \$10.00.

Membership: There are currently 469 active members.

Rebloom Report: George Sutton recommended we change the reporting dates for the Rebloom Report to January 1 through December 31 of each year. It was suggested that the Rebloom Report be made available electronically as well. Margaret Sutton moved that the reporting time for the Rebloom Report be changed to start on January 1 and run through December 31, that it be printed in the spring Recorder, and that it be made available on the website. George Sutton seconded. The motion carried.

Reblooming Symposium: It will be printed in the fall Recorder and will be returned to Shirley Trio.

NEW BUSINESS

Dues Changes: Charlie Brown proposed that we drop the dual membership classification as there is no real benefit to it. Sandy Ives moved and Margaret Sutton seconded that we discontinue the dual annual and dual triennial memberships. After discussion the question was called and the motion failed.

Dues Increase: Margaret Sutton moved that we increase our dues to a rate compatible with other sections:

Single Annual = \$10.00 Dual Annual = \$12.00 Single Triennial = \$25.00 Dual Triennial = \$30.00

Dave Silverberg seconded and the motion passed.

Proposal from Section Rep: AIS asked that we agree to consider the option of offering a section membership at half price when a new member joins AIS. It was duly moved and seconded that we agree to consider this idea if it is passed by the AIS board. Motion carried.

Committee to Reorganize Director Areas: George Sutton moved and Margaret Sutton seconded a motion to create a committee to look at reorganizing the director areas, including any necessary bylaw changes. The committee shall be: Shirley Trio, Sandy Ives, Joan Roberts, Dave Silverberg, Charlie Brown, and Rita Gormley. The motion carried.

I would like to invite more of you, the readership, to participate. It all begins when the spring catalogs reach our mail boxes. Visions of fabulous new irises blooming in our spring gardens and stalwart remontants

putting on a second show later in the year encourages most of us to spend more than we wish. But, alas, when those buds of promise

begin to blossom, the sheer pleasure of it is truly satisfying.

The RIS Recorder can help you in your planning. Note what the regional directors say about different cultivars and check what irises

are listed as reblooming in your region/USDA Zone. Try some of the cultivars suggested as high performers. Make a few changes, if need be, in your gardening regimen to encourage more rebloom. Be creative, ask questions, and try something new (whether it's a new iris, a new fertilizer, or a new way of doing things).

When spring bloom abates and the heat of summer sets in, your new iris purchases will begin to arrive. After planting for next year's spring extravaganza, it's time to focus on rebloom. Because rebloomers are accelerated growers, they need a little more of everything. Some advocate not treating them any differently than oncers. However, in my experience I have found that many RE cultivars will reward you handsomely for the gift of a little extra TLC.

When those first coveted rebloom stalks begin to appear, make plans for some record keeping. On pages 30 and 31 we have provided a form for keeping track of your rebloom. Make a copy, put it on a clip board, and take it with you to the garden. (These forms will also be available as PDFs on our RIS web site at www.rebloomingiris.com.) Your rebloom

notes can be of real benefit to fellow irisarians.

At the end of the rebloom season, send a copy of your notes to your regional director. Their addresses are listed on page 1. E-mails are also listed for your convenience. The directors will in turn send that information on to the editor. This data can be

published as collective regional or individual reports.

This information is also important to the committee that oversees updating the Checklist. It's all about communication. The more we share the rebloom knowl-

edge we have, the faster advances will be made in developing higher quality remontant irises.

My next concern is about printing in full color. It is expensive. Without additional contributions to the color printing fund, it can not continue. For 600 copies of this 32-page 2008 RIS Winter *Recorder*, it will cost about \$5.25 each <u>plus</u> additional expenses for labeling, postage, and shipping. Two issues alone will cost more than a single annual membership!

Color printing is like icing on the cake. It greatly improves the quality of the document, builds our awareness of different cultivars, and will result in increased publicity for remontant irises as well as increased membership. 





normal branching and the blooms did not last as long, but they were beautiful to us and deserve credit for their efforts.

In our iris garden, which is too far away to hand water, 'Cameo Blush' BB (J. Weiler '98) and 'Again And Again' TB (S. Innerst '99) were stars. Both had several stalks and excellent flowers. 'Northward Ho' TB (L. Zurbrigg '91), 'Raspberry Frost' TB (G. Sutton '01), and 'Remarkable' TB (R. Smith '94) (which lives up to its name), also remonted. 'Champagne Junior' BB (O.D. Niswonger '94) and 'Champagne Encore' IB (J.T. Aitken '97) were beauti-

ful, staying in bloom for weeks!

Andy and Jean Crossland reported that 'October Splendor' BB (G. Sides '97) rebloomed in November.

Jay and Brenda Holcomb reported that 'Lunar Whitewash' TB (S. Innerst '03) was spectacular. Also reblooming for them were 'Again And Again' TB (S. Innerst '99). 'Many Happy Returns' TB (B. Hager '88), 'Rosalie Figge' TB (J. McKnew '91), 'Queen Dorothy' TB (E. Hall

'84), and 'Glitter Bit' SDB (J. Weiler '97).

Sterling Innerst had 'Maui Mango' MTB (J.T. Aitken '05) and 'Again And Again TB (S. Innerst

'99) bloom in his garden.

were blessed with some rain and their irises did very well. The Tall Bearded irises reblooming were 'Again And Again TB (S. Innerst '99), 'Clarence' TB (L. Zurbrigg '91), and 'Comic Opera' TB (G. Sutton '06).

The real story here are the Miniature Tall Bearded irises that rebloomed for them: 'Aglow Again' MTB (K. Fisher '04), 'Lady Di' MTB (W.T. Varner '89). 'Lady Emma' MTB (F. Jones '86), and

not to be outdone, 'Maui Mango' MTB (J.T. Aitken '05) bloomed in the spring, rebloomed in September, October, and again on November 13th (even though there had been a few mild freezes). This iris is not only beautiful, but it is among the elite few Miniature Tall Bearded irises that reblooms for us on the East Coast

Northwestern Report By Director Dave Silverberg

I want to thank all those who took time from their busy schedules to send me the records of their rebloom.

Ruby Eruption SDB (C. Chapman '97)

The Canada geese were gathering in large flocks in late August and early September and to me that meant an early onset of winter. My concern

about an early winter was a needless wor-The concern that we had that a ma-

jor replanting in 2007 would reduce the 2008 bloom proved to be unfounded. 2008 had the best and the longest rebloom season in the 14 years I have lived here in Molalla, OR. Substantial rebloom had been there right from the start for the SDBs which appeared right on schedule. Rebloom began on July 5 with 'Au-

tumn Jester' SDB (C. Chapman '00) and ended on December 3 with a Nancy Price seedling that has been named but not yet introduced. 'Autumn Jester' rebloomed an additional four times in July, Sept., and Oct. From the same hybridizer we had 'Forever Blue' SDB (C. Chapman '97) in July and Oct. and 'Ruby Eruption' SDB (C. Chapman '97) in July and Oct.

I was most impressed with 'Impulsive Imp' SDB (B. Blyth '04/05). We acquired it in 2007 and I can't state for certain that it bloomed Spring 2008 but it sure got my attention in Oct. Seems to me that 'Impulsive Imp' was still on Australia time with the first of 9 stalks opening on Oct. 25. There were other varieties that made a distinct impression and at the top of the list is 'Renascent' TB (B. Hager '04). From a single rhizome planted Aug. 2007, it increased well enough to send up a spring bloom followed by another in Aug. and Oct. It has great form and the Aug. stalk showed excellent branching but

the Oct. stalk, like many others this year, was "snakey". 'Love Goes On' BB (D. Spoon '04) is an iris that just wouldn't quit. It seemed that every time I turned around, there she was showing off again. From Sterling Innerst there was 'Again And Again' TB ('99) bloomed four times with later stalks being low on

> bud count (as expected) and 'Over and Over' TB ('01) which put up four well-spaced-out bloom stalks with a consistent 14 buds.

I was concerned that 'Sky King Returns' TB ('03) from Larry Lauer was going to bloom out. We planted a single rhizome in late Sept.

2007 and it produced not only spring bloom but three additional rebloom stalks. It shows its Edith Wolford (B. Hager

'86) heritage. Larry's 'Cruise to Autumn' TB ('01) also sent up three rebloom stalks that held up well even in late summer and early fall heat.

From the master of broken color, Brad Kasperek, we have 'Doe Z Doe' IB ('05) and 'Rhea Peerz' IB ('99). I

was most impressed by the bright orange beard Doe Z Doe IB which highlighted the silver streaks in the fall in 'Doe Z Doe' and the circle of bright yellow (11 stalks) from 'Rhea Peerz', both of which were a 2007 acquisition. We got 'Autumn Surge' SDB (J.T. Aitken '05) the year it was in-

troduced and it has never failed to perform and perform well. Another that fast became a favorite is 'Sailboat Bay' SDB (L. Zurbrigg '01).

We replanted it in 2007 and it sent up twelve stalks over a four-month span.

I noted that there were many rebloom stalks this year that were excellently branched without the expected rebloom bunching. 'Total Re-

call' TB (B. Hager '92), 'Ozark Rebounder' TB

fectly spaced blooms), 'October Splendor' BB (G. Sides '97, great pink color). Saving the best for last, I would recommend 'Autumn Apricot' TB (A. Thimsen '88). It has the best branching of any reblooming iris I have seen!

The rebloom reports from Washington and Idaho

were excellent; each one clean, clear, and concise. Sharon Touchstone in Idaho reported excellent rebloom on varieties that originated in Sandhollow Gardens (Laura Morrison and the late Keith Chadwick). 'July Yellow' TB (K. Chadwick/E. Warner '01) performed continuously for five months in the Touchstone garden

and rebloomed well for Cheryl Bigelow in Washington. Other iris in the Touchstone garden from Sandhollow that performed above and beyond were 'Oasis Amy' TB (K. Chadwick

'04), 'Oasis Terry' TB (K. Chadwick '05), 'Oasis Plum Jam' TB (K. Chadwick '02), and 'Lorna's Rosita' TB (E. Werner '03). I should also

mention 'Elmer's Thunder' TB (L. (02) Morrison which showed excellent four-way branching. Another with good branching (and I like the name) is 'Wonder Woman' TB (K. Chadwick (07).

Cheryl Bigelow reported that 'Cruise to Autumn' TB (L. Lauer '01), 'Low Ho Silver' IB (M. Byers '89), and 'Feed Back' TB (B. Hager '83) rebloomed well. These were good performers in our garden as well. Marjorie Clements reported that 'Champagne Elegance' TB (OD) Niswonger '87), and 'Renascent' TB (B. Hager '05) always provide good rebloom (ditto here). Marjorie also reported that 'Ahwahnee Princess' SDB (G. Sutton

'04) is a consistent rebloomer as is 'Double Shot' TB (G. Sutton '00) along with 'Autumn Wine' BB (V. Christopherson '03). Also performing well in the Clements iris patch was 'Autumn Ivory' BB (G. Spoon '01) and 'Honeycomb' TB (L. Lauer '06).

As a final note, Nancy and I were pleasantly surprised by a reblooming report on 'Sense Of

Wonder' SDB (N. Price '07) Dixon from

Reblooming Iris in North Alabama By Eugene Baxley

Sugar Blues TB (L. Zurbrigg '85)

I had been raising Tall Bearded iris for several years before I became aware that some of them would bloom again in the fall. At

that point I began to look for reblooming TBs in the catalogs and I began to buy some of those which they designated as reblooming iris. I soon learned that is because an iris was designated as a reblooming iris it did not necessarily mean that it would rebloom for me. Very seldom would I get repeat bloom or rebloom. Sometimes those designated rebloomers would bloom in

the fall months that followed their purchase and would never rebloom again.

One fall day I was walking around the grounds of the Huntsville/Madison County Botanical Garden and I came upon a blue iris in full bloom. I think the month was August, but my memory cannot confirm it. I looked at the label and it was 'Sugar Blues' TB (L. Zurbrigg '85). I saw it in rebloom again later that

year. The next year I checked to see if it was still doing its stuff and it was. I called the CEO of the Botanical Garden inquiring about a pos-

sible purchase of a rhizome or two. I had never seen it in any catalog or, at least, I did not remember it. He promised to get one or two rhizomes for me to purchase and after he hung up, he promptly forgot.

I finally got two rhizomes of this iris from Schreiners. When it began putting on its show, I was hooked on reblooming iris! It has rebloomed at least

three times each fall that I have had it except this year. I took up three clumps of it when I was redoing the bed to add some later iris for the AIS Region 24 tour. I put two rhizomes back in and I put some in pots. I gave the rest away to club members. In the fall of 2007 'Sugar Blues' had one stalk up with fifteen buds and five were open. That was very impressive.

The RIS "Checklist" By Robin Shadlow

2008 Cumulative Checklist

Reblooming The Iris Society maintains a separate checklist which contains additional infor-

mation not included in the American Iris Society registry checklist. The Cumulative Checklist of Reblooming Iris is a collection of all

the cultivars that have ever been reported to rebloom. Where possible, the Checklist reports the climate zones and states where each cultivar has been reported to rebloom in as well as the registration information.

This Checklist is an update of the 1998 RIS Checklist and includes all of the data previously reported in earlier Checklists. The 2008 Checklist was compiled by Linda Mann, Betty Wilkerson, and myself. It took more than three years from the

time we started due to the steps needed to convert the old Checklist and combine it with the new data. Rosalie Figge maintained the updates since the 1998 Checklist and is owed a great debt of gratitude for all of her work in maintaining the records over all those years.

We send out the rebloom report forms along with the Recorder, but it has been pointed out that we never really explain what we do with all of that data. A little information here and there from different gardeners around the world adds up to a lot of significant information as the size of the 2008 Checklist will attest.

The checklist crew compiles all of the reports and compares it to the reports already received. We keep track of the states where the rebloom is reported as well as the climate zones. When reporting, please do include either your zip code or your zone. It is easy to find your zone if you check: http://www.usna. usda.gov/Hardzone/hzm-nm1.html or http:// www.garden.org/zipzone/.

You may wonder why it matters which zone? Many states have significantly different growing conditions in different areas. For

example, Utah ranges from areas in Zone 4 to Zone 7. It's not a perfect system, but if an iris has been reported to rebloom in your state and your zone, it may well be one to try. As much fun as it is to try new rebloomers in your garden, no one can try them all. The Checklist can help narrow down your choices.

mend cultivars to people wanting to try a few rebloomers. Some cultivars like 'Immortality' and 'Rosalie Figge' have reports in over half the states, several countries, and nearly every zone. These are obvious choices for reliable rebloom recommendations. The Checklist makes these easy to locate.

Sending in rebloom reports also helps the hybridizers. Different hybridizers looks for dif-

of Reblooming Irises ferent things. Several of us are very interested in seeing what reblooms in Australia and California. Crossing these cultivars with the cold climate rebloomers can improve form and retain some rebloom in the resultant seedlings. You would be surprised at how much time is spent pouring over the RIS Checklist, looking at performance around the country, as well as the parentages.

So if you happen to see your form laying around, take a minute and fill it out or send an e-mail to your director. You never know if your report might catch someone's eye, give them an idea of something to try, and one day end up being responsible for a reblooming Dykes Medal winner!

We are working to update the Checklist more frequently. We now have the data in RTF and Excel forms making for easier searches. Any comments, corrections, or suggestions are always welcome. E-mail me at: rshadlow@yahoo.com.



I gave these trainings using a digital projector and lap top computer, a gift from Bryan, and the color pictures were very close to their appearance in nature. It turned out to be easier than I thought taking the equipment on the plane to Oregon because they both fit into the carry-on luggage

The members of both groups were really excited about some of our SDB seedlings that are royal blue, grass green, and intense tur-

quoise blue-green, such as 'Teagan', one of our 2009 introductions. was thrilled to go to both of these meetings and had a great time. Eating grapes in Tom Johnson's orchard, looking at all the new plantings at



Mid-America and talking with Paul Black, seeing Keith Keppel's garden (no weeds at all!), seeing the fall colors in New York, eating the most delicious apples I have ever eaten (Empire apples, a gift from Dorothy Stiefel and the Oswego members), and just the friendship of everyone at both places was wonderful.

When I mentioned that 75 percent of the iris sales for Winterberry Gardens were of rebloomers, the hybridizers took notice. Hope-

can be nipped by late frosts more often than the later spring only bloomers that deters some hybridizers from working on them; or, perhaps, it is because they don't

realize

that now rebloomers have just as modern form as the once bloomers.

Some think that the rebloomers are putting up

stalks just when they need to be dug and shipped. We find that only a small number of our cultivars, such 'Love Goes On', 'Twiggy', and 'Midsum-Eve', mer's

sometimes put

up a stalk during our major shipping time (July and August). Nearly all of our 1400+ reblooming cultivars don't rebloom

until October and November. We have received iris plants from other suppliers with developing stalks that we planted and had no problems getting established with the stalk completing development and blooming, though with a somewhat shorter stalk with smaller flowers.

I did not list any of our seedlings in my rebloom report except 'Mango Parfait' TB ('09) and 'Margaret Wilson Thomas' TB ('09), but we had quite a few rebloom this fall. Several that we

thought were quite beautiful were: Returning Rose X Twiggy, a lovely rose-pink plicata TB that rebloomed early in late August; 2006-135 (Mariposa Autumn X Zee), a plum plicata TB and white ground with 17 buds rebloomed in mid September; TB seedling out of Mariposa Autumn X Daughter of Stars, a dark Bishop's purple fanciata (luminata-plicata), 2005-575 (Hot Chic X Royal Maroon) a red SDB from

performing dwarf this fall with profuse bloom from early September until late November. Trimmed Velvet can have stalks with 4 buds and has ruffled blossoms. Don is

looking forward to crossing these dwarfs with multiple buds to produce new seedlings that extend the bloom season both in the spring and the fall. The earlier rebloomers were of special interest to the New York members as they are in a much colder zone than we are and have earlier freezes. Still, they are able to enjoy some rebloom in their Zone 5.

In the past, it was necessary to cross rebloomers on modern formed spring only blooming rebloom carriers with modern form to obtain truly modern formed rebloomers. Now, with so many new rebloomers with modern form to choose as parents, we are making more crosses of our best performing summer and fall blooming rebloomers and obtaining seedlings that bloom even earlier in August, September, and even in July. Our goal is to extend the bloom of our bearded irises throughout the whole bloom season.

most as many stalks in October as they did in May! Don and I had talked about this possibility ten years earlier and were overjoyed to witness this fall kaleidoscope wonderland. Now we are imagining the day, maybe in ten years, when the midsummer bloom equals the

and fall in number of blooming stalks, when new multiple, all-season bloomers dominate our bearded iris plantings. Whale some of these varieties may be producing stalks at shipping time, it should still be possible to ship some of the lined out plants that have not become established enough to put up a rebloom stalk. This is a problem only for those who sell the plants but certainly not for the

people who grow them to enjoy.

Several years ago we sold equal numbers of spring only bloomers and rebloomers to our wholesale buyers. These retailers found that their customers preferred rebloomers. Now, these retailers want just rebloomers and only order rebloomers at our wholesale rates. If the customer is always right, the future for rebloomers is bright. The last three years we

Kentucky Rebloomers Find Success in Central VA By Mike Lockatell

Leadership is a very special personal quality. Anyone embarking

down this road needs to be bold and have the courage to stand by their convictions. The road can be lonely with one's followers failing to see

your point of view particularly at "crunch time." It requires a dogged determination to see a course of action to its conclusion and accept any consequences. Some of the best leadership I have seen is by example.

Many of the original rebloom trailblazers followed

this recipe. They persevered and found success. They have passed the leader's baton to their willing heirs. Some of the toughest riddles facing remontancy wait to be solved. Does the next generation have the "right stuff" to get the job done?

One of Dr. Lloyd Zurbrigg's last acts was to get me involved in a nationwide rebloom forum. This discussion forged a friendship with Betty Wilkerson of Bridge In Time Iris Garden in Bowling Green, Kentucky. The Bluegrass State still feels like a geographic eternity from the Old Dominion, but we were at least on the same side of the world. As our association has grown via E-mails and phone calls, Betty has offered me an intriguing "sneak peek" into the future of rebloom.

My Powhatan County, VA garden at the Cosby Diary Farm has a decided rebloom flavor to it. The main goal is to trial past and present bearded remontant varieties and seedlings for reliability and garden performance in our fickle Middle Atlantic climate. Another aim is to promote in real time the value of rebloom in the home landscape to the general public.

Betty Wilkerson has actively contributed to this effort. The end result is some encouraging summer and fall flowering results to report on 'Echo Location' TB ('07), 'Tara's Choice' TB ('04), 'Star Gate' TB ('05), and 'Summer Radiance' TB ('96).

Betty sent me bare root divisions of Echo Location and Tara's Choice back in the sammer of 2004 for evaluation in my former garden site in the Flamock Section of Powham County. Dr. Zurbrigg and I were excited to test the latest products of our fellow breeder's rebloom program. Each

selection was potted up for later planting. Installation unfortunately never happened as I was forced to move my entire garden of irises and herbaceous peonies during the 2005 growing season.

The Cosby Diary Farm in western Poan County became the new home for my splay, production, and breeding garden. Eco Location' and 'Tara's Choice' miraculously survived their long stints in one-gallon pots. They were finally planted in the main display area mid fall of 2006. Thanks to a devastating and April 2007 freeze, I did not see maiden on 'Echo Location' until late September performance was spectacular with the developed bloom stalks to enjoy.

Two cross pollinations lead to seed. One was No.#1510 or Innocent Star X Radiant Bliss. 'Radiant Bliss' TB (B. Wilkerson '05) has tried to rebloom for me in 2007 and 2008. A child of 'Earl Of Essex' TB (L. Zurbrigg '80) and Hot Streak TB (J. Ghio '88), this neat plicata features greyed orange standards and falls

with beetroot edging and gold overlay accenting a white ground. This combination led to 'All Revved Up' TB (B. Wilkerson '06). The other cross was No.=1511 or Innocent Star X Rebound (Wilkerson 96). 'Rebound' TB (B.

Wilkerson '96) is Highland Chief X Earl Of Essex. Four out of seven seedlings initiated fall flower. "They looked like 'Rebound', but 'Echo Location' was one of a kind," Betty mentioned fondly.

'Echo Location' reminds me of Frank Fan's 'Melted Butter' TB ('94). Butter yellow flowers are accented with brown haft lines and white beards tipped yellow. An explosion of bloomstalks started appearing in mid September 2008. It ended up blooming for almost a

month and a half on fourteen nice-sized stalks. It was the envy of any typical spring bloomer and the best remontant in my fall garden.

'Tara's Choice' ('04) did not flower for me until this year. Its standards are greyed reddish purple. Medium blue falls have shoulders and one-forth inch edging of the same color as standards. This child of (Her Royal Highness x Inferno) X Feed Back was the result of Betty's attempts to create a red rebloomer. "Red rebloomers were, and still are, hard to find," mentioned Wilkerson. "It had fall bloom in

1994, and I stuck a flag on it." This seedling made the trip to Betty's new garden in Bowling Green. Her daughter Tara was living with her during the first fall at the new address. "I was bugging her one day to go out and look at the rebloom seedlings with me. She said, "I already told you which one I like!" It became 'Tara's Choice'.

'Tara's Choice' TB ('04) rebloomed this fall in mid October. Stalks were short with medium sized flowers. The contrast of coloring on the falls was quite distinctive. It has been a good breeding partner for Betty. She has high hopes for 'Tara's Choice' offspring. Like most iris breeders, Wilkerson anxiously awaits spring

bloom. There is a good bet one of them will eventually make its way to the iris marketplace.

'Rosalie Figge' TB (McKnew '91) is one of the best purple remontants to date. As good as it is as a garden plant, this child of Dykes Medal winning 'Titan's Glory' TB (Schreiners '81) has been frustrating to

use for breeding. Wilkerson tried using 'Violet Rosalie Figge TB Miracle TB (L. Zurbrigg '79) pollen on 'Feed (J. McKnew '93)

Back' TB (B. Hager '83). 'Star Gate' TB ('05) was the overall best of fifteen seedlings planted. Betty registered it back in 2002 as a medium-to-dark blue violet with white veining near old gold tipped white beards. Fall bloom had nice contrast next to one of my pale pink rebloom seedlings. Gate' flowered in my fall garden on two well-proportioned stalks during the bal-

(B. Wilkerson '96) ance of October after being planted out of a pot earlier in the year. Released in 2005 with little fanfare, rebloom enthusiasts should consider it a worthy alternative to 'Rosalie Figge'. 'Violet Miracle' has once again proved its value as an important remontant parent.

> 'Summer Radiance' TB ('96) always seemed to surface in my many conversations with Betty. It was a mystery iris to me. The late Dr. Zurbrigg never mentioned it in my constant deliberations with him before his passing in 2005. I figured this Wilkerson dandy must be a local phenomenon of some kind. My recent

experiences growing it over the past year indicate Betty found the right name to describe its exceptional performance.

The parentage of 'Summer Radiance' is Lemon Reflection X Hidenburg. Betty made



five crosses on Dr. Raymond Smith's remontant (`78)1990. back in "I planted eight seedlings." A later note said, "E31-01=BRIGHT. was most im-

pressed with the color (chrome-yellow) and branching. They were very good for a rebloomer. After spring bloom, E31-01 put up late stalks after six weeks. I was ecstatic!! July bloom usually creates talk."

'Summer Radiance' confirmed its Kentucky rebloom habits in my garden this past summer. It had been planted out of a pot at the same time as 'Echo Location' and 'Tara's Choice'. This Wilkerson beauty bloomed this spring and initiated flower stalks on two clumps from mid-to-late June. Bloom returned again in mid July. Its chrome-yellow coloring stood out during our hot summer days. A major obstacle

in fall rebloom is late bloomstalk development. 'Summer Radiance', like 'Gate of Heaven' TB (Zurbrigg '04), offers remontant breeders some interesting options to overcome this problem.

Recent Wilkerson rebloom introductions are not only residing in my Central VA garden. they have also been planted in tour gardens for the AIS Region 4 Spring Meeting hosted by the Fredericksburg Area Iris Society in Northern VA this coming May. Summer and fall flowering results have in most cases been duplicated in these growing spaces.

Breeders are driven by endless expectations. They are the necessary fuel to keep a development program moving in a positive direction. The secret to Betty Wilkerson's recent rebloom conquests is meticulous research and careful planning of crosses to be made each spring. These practices become important hedges against countless disappointment She has left few stones unturned over a tweets-five year hybridizing career.

Despite recent medical setbacks, she remains undaunted in her quest to put remontants on a level playing field with their spring-only flowering cousins. Thanks to Betty's recent contributions, the next chapter for rebloom will surely be an exciting one!

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Reblooming Iris Culture: Highlights from the Writings of Rosalie Figge By Carole Buchheim

It is well to evaluate the culture of our remontant irises to encourage optimal growth for quality spring bloom as well as repeat bloom. Basic culture for bearded irises does not fully meet the needs of remontants because they are accelerated growers. Dr. Herb Holk used to tell me that reblooming irises needed more of everything: more food, more water, more space, and more TLC.

In reading over past issues of the *Recorder* I have found several articles with excellent tips on rebloom culture. Rosalie Figge's article, *Why Rebloomers?* — *Why Not?*, Vol. 48, Fall Winter 1996/97 was filled with sage advice. Following is a list of key points from that article. Statements in parenthesis are by the editor.

- 1. Water is the key ward. It was a second to extra water is needed to extra water as a second to go dormant during the natural inclination of an extra water as a second to extra water as a
- 2. For more successful rebloom, buy cultivars that are known to rebloom in your area. Rebloomers marked with 'RE' in supplier catalogs "known to rebloom in their own gardens" are more likely to rebloom for you than those marked with 're' which are "reported to rebloom elsewhere".
- 3. The growth cycle of rebloomers is accelerated and their peak bloom is a week to ten days before the spring-only bloomers. (It is rare for a "mother rhizome" to develop more than one bloomstalk in a season; therefore, rebloom actually occurs on maturing "daughter rhizomes" prior to the first hard frost. Reblooming irises grow twice and fast and bloom twice as often as "oncers".)
- 4. All irises need about a half-day of sun and bearded irises need well-drained beds.
- 5. Low nitrogen fertilizers such as 10-10-10 or 5-10-10 can be worked into the freshly tilled soil. Irises also benefit from a side dressing of superphosphate such as 0-44-0. A treatment of Miracle-Gro can also be of benefit. Other excellent additives include alfalfa pellets, horse feed is preferable to rabbit feed, peat moss, and horse manure. If using fresh manure, it should not be against the rhizomes. (If you have heavy clay or adobe soil, Dr. Rich Richards recom-

mends that you amend your soil every other year with up to a pound of gypsum per every square foot and up to a cubic foot of peat moss per 30 square feet of garden soil.)

- 6. When planting the irises, position the rhizomes even with the soil surface so that the sun can warm them. If planting in September, just barely cover the rhizomes so they won't heave during the freezing and thawing of winter. (In light, well-drained soils plant rhizomes up to an inch deep. This type of soil dries out much faster than heavier soils.)
- 7. The closer the plants are placed, the sooner they will need to be replanted. Rhizomes should be planted 10 to 24 inches apart. Irises should be divided and replanted every three to four years (every other year in west coast gardens).
- 8. Separate rhizomes carefully, discarding the old rhizomes and replanting the new fans. Cut the green fans to eight inches or so (and roots two to three inches). Routinely cutting leaves of all irises throughout the garden in August is not recommended.
- 9. Note that the fans grow from the center out, spreading at the top. When the outer leaves have turned brown, they will come off easily with a slight tug. Do not pull more strongly as it can cause plant wounds susceptible to disease or rot.
- 10. Keep iris beds clean of dead leaves in order to eliminate debris for egg-laying borers (as well as other insect pests, fungal leaf spot spores, or other disease). Cygon-2 can be sprayed for the borer and Benlate for leaf spot.
- 11. Remove spent bloomstalks with a quick back and forth snap movement or cut the stalks level with the rhizome so that a hard white area shows -- not tinged greenish which is softer and allows rot to set in. (Perhaps this is an eastern treatment for spent fall bloomstalks; I believe most west coast growers cut the bloomstalks 2" to 3" above the rhizome.)
- 12. Do not mulch irises. However, if you do mulch, leave the rhizomes exposed to the sun. Soaker hoses are a good method for supplemental summer watering. (Drip tape irrigation is also a water wise method of providing supplemental water.)

Rebloom Report, Valley Center, CA By Alex Stanton

My wife, Kitty, and I finally ran out of room for growing irises at our residence in Escondido, CA. In March 2008 we purchased a 12-acre farm property in Valley Center, CA about 12 miles from

our home. The sloping landscape and fertile soil provide excellent drainage. A portion of the new property was used for farming for many years and an excellent well and irrigation system were already in place. We began transplanting our irises in June of 2008 with amazing results. Many of our cultivars began blooming just 90 days after transplant and 40% of my seedlings sent up maiden bloom

I believe three things have contributed to our excellent rebloom. The first is our incredible southern Cali-

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

three teaspoons per gallon (one teaspoon per gallon for roses). It nearly eliminates transplant shock and you can see the difference between treated plants and untreated plants within a week. This can also improve your show stalks and flowers by at least 20%. (I have two boxes of trophies and a Queen of Show from last year to prove it.) I fertilize my plants with this foliar spray every 11/2 to 2 months. I first used Dyna-gro in my hydroponics garden but when

I received similar results in my normal garden by using it as a foliar spray, I terminated my hydroponics project.

We now have about four acres planted in bearded irises. I am focusing on developing modern form reblooming irises with the goal of merchandising them in local nurseries. Several of my newer favorites that rebloomed this fall and winter are: 'Jo Bangles' IB (B. Blyth '07/08), 'Plasma' IB (B. Blyth '06/07), 'Tripod' IB (M. Sutton '06), 'Chain Reaction' AB (R. Tasco '07), 'Creative Vision' TB (F. Kerr '05), 'Merchant Marine' TB (K. Keppel '07), 'Peggy Sue' TB (L. Lauer '06), 'Puff The Magic' TB (B. Blyth '06/07),

'Red Hot Chili' IB (M. Sutton '08), and 'Wonderful News' TB (J. Ghio '07).

Early and Very Early Iris Crosses By George Sutton

George Sutton

On December 2, our son Michael marked 100 plus very

nice reblooming iris seedlings, bringing the total to well over 400 that we marked this year for further evaluation.

Our program started with the crossing together of early and very early clones for about four generations. In 2002, Michael introduced 'Tropical

Delight'; in 2004, he brought out

'Bride's Blush', 'Return to Bayberry', and 'Snow Melt'. In 2000, I introduced 'Momentous Occasion' and in 2004, 'Grand Circle' and Soft Return. Michael added 'Mountain Sunrise' in 2007, which has turned out to be a fantastic parent for producing very good reblooming seedlings. The varieties listed above are heavily in the

background of many of this year's reblooming seedlings. This is not an exhaustive list of what we use, only the most heavily used ones.

Most of the seedlings that we will see for the first time in 2009 are out of these lines. The crosses made this year, which we will see for the first time in fall 2009 or spring 2010, have some outbreeding done to keep up the vigor of the plants. We bring in new lines every three or four years.

It has been a long time

now since anyone has been justified a saves "it's very nice for a rebloomer". Resumes

are now certainly the equal of any "oncers" in form, branching, bud count, and growth habits. In fact, it looks like our 2010 catalog introductions may very well all be rebloomers, a first!

Garden Evaluation of Remontant Seedlings

By George Sutton

Our five-phase garden evaluation of remontant seedlings begins about four months after they have been planted out in the field. Seeds are originally planted in pots and transplanted when big enough, which occurs in March in our area.

Phase 1: The plant on close observation

- a. vigor: number of increase from one rhizome
- b. hardiness: disease resistance, weather damage
- c. fan characteristics: thin, wide, tip droop, color, floppy, variegated

Phase 2: Emerging stalks

- a. strength: too thin, overly fat
- b. balance and proportion of stalk to branches
- c. number of buds

- d. bud placement: above foliage, not crowded
- e. ratio of stalks to fans in a clump

Phase 3: Flower

- a. balance and proportion to the overall plant
- b. substance and texture
- c. shape and positioning of standards and falls


