Webmaster Report

The AIS Region 2 Website (AISRegion2.org) is up and running and is updated monthly. I hope everyone is checking it from time to time. In addition to current articles from the Region 2 Newsletter, it contains our bylaws, histories of the Region 2 Awards, information on our shows and sales and our yearly budget.

It has been generating about one contact per month requesting information on iris or about our clubs. It's nice to know that we are out there and that people are finding it. If your club has a special event that you'd like publicized on our website, please let me know.

Currently I Host Networks is providing a site for our webpage. Their monthly fee is \$9.95 and there is an additional annual fee of \$14.95 for our website name – AISRegion2.org. I also purchased a copy of Web Easy Software which allows me to maintain our website. The cost for the software was \$45.93 and I have been reimbursed for the expense by our treasurers. Since I was not billed \$9.95 for the month of January, our total cost for the webpage for 2008 will be \$170.33. This exceeds the \$150.00 budgeted for the Region 2 Website by more than 10% and we will need approval by the Board of Directors to increase the expenditure in this budget category for this year.

If there is not an increase in fees from I Host Networks in 2009, our annual expense should be \$134.35 for next year. There should not be a need to increase the budget amount for the Region 2 Website in the 2009 budget.

Please let me know if you have any suggestions for additional material to be included in the Region 2 Website. It might be nice to have a collection of pictures of iris gardens in Region 2.



Joe Pye Weed's Garden Honors Jerry Murphy with New Iris Euthemia Matsoukas

Jan Sacks and Marty Schafer of Joe Pye Weed's Garden have named one of their new introductions for 2008 after our good friend Jerry Murphy, former President of the Hudson Valley Iris and Daylily Society, who died last year. Jan Sacks writes: "When this iris first bloomed in 2004 the idea of brown Siberians was something people still laughed about and we were not sure it would be accepted. We were excited about it as one of our first children of 'So Van Gogh'. We left it in the field for several years and were pleased at how many people commented on it because it makes such a grand clump. When Howie Dash told me that Jerry's favorites were brown and yellow, we knew this iris would be perfect to name for him. Its coloring comes from the combination of yellow overlaid with pink, blue and purple. The exact coloring changes depending on the weather during the

development of each bud - sometimes it is very dark and sometimes much lighter."

The description of 'Jerry Murphy' in their new catalog reads: "A very special iris to honor our friend Jerry Murphy, an enthusiastic iris lover from the Hudson Valley. The simple description of this iris is a brown amoena. On close examination the falls have a pale apricot ground which shows on the rim and is covered by various shades and amounts of red-violet stippling and blending. The standards and styles are creamy with light gold trim. The depth of color varies and the flower lightens as it ages. Gorgeous green foliage lasts late into the fall. The clump effect is lovely with flowers held well above the foliage and it blooms a long time with four to five buds per stalk. Sib of 'On Her Toes' ('Strawberry Social' x sib of 'Book of Secrets'/'Dawn Waltz'/'Off She Goes') X 'So Van Gogh'.


Editors note:

This article was reprinted from the March 2008 Capital Hudson Iris Society (CHIS) Newsletter, Volume 15, Number 3.

Special note:

There will be two potted 'Jerry Murphy' Siberian iris plants available at the Region 2 Silent Auction. They were purchased by the Southern Tier Iris Society and donated to the Creative Money Committee.

In 1987 Ben Hager registered an iris that was a cross between two species of iris. This iris, 'Roy Davidson', was introduced the same year by Melrose Gardens. The pod parent for this iris was *Iris pseudacorus* that was pollinated by some other species of iris. There are a number of species crosses that have appeared which have *Iris pseudacorus* as one of their parents and they are considered to be sterile although viable seeds have been rarely produced.

The blooms of 'Roy Davidson' are yellow and are lightly veined with brown on the falls. The deep yellow signal is crescent shaded with a deep brown outline. Under favorable conditions the plants can reach three feet in height. In my garden it grows well without extra water, but I have seen plants growing in ponds in gardens featured on American Iris Society (AIS) National Convention tours in different part of the United States.

Interestingly, two hybridizers observed pods forming on 'Roy Davidson' in their gardens. Both planted the resulting seeds and each introduced two of the seedlings they obtained. One hybridizer was Terry Aitken who operates Aitken's Salmon Creek Garden in Vancouver, Washington, with his wife Barbara. The other hybridizer is Region 2's Dana Borglum who operates Borglum's Iris Gardens near Geneva, New York, with his wife Sylvia.

Terry Aitken introduced 'Roy's Lines' and 'Roy's Repeater' in 2002. It is thought that the pollen parent was *Iris versicolor* 'Between the Lines'. I first saw these cultivars in bloom at Salmon Creek Gardens at the 2006 AIS Convention and ordered them that fall.



'Roy's Lines'

'Roy's Lines' has white flowers which are delicately veined with purple. The signal is pale yellow and the style arms are white. The overall appearance of the flower from the distance is a delicate pastel purple that almost shimmers in the breeze.

Its sibling, 'Roy's Repeater', is supposed to rebloom and has white flowers heavily overlaid with purple veins. The blooms have a dark yellow signal with purple veins running through it.




'Roy's Repeater'

Both 'Roy's Lines' and 'Roy's Repeater' bloom from mid late to very late in the season and have a registered height of 42". In my garden their foliage is about three feet tall. Although they both started blooming at the same time 'Roy's Repeater' was in bloom a couple of weeks longer than 'Roy's Lines

Dana Borglum registered 'Child of Roy' in 2004 and it was introduced in 2005. This iris is much shorter with a registered height of 23" and blooms midseason with white flowers with purple striping. The signal is yellow with dark purple veining. It has not been a good grower for me and I almost lost my plant this past winter. It is still alive but failed to bloom. It has much larger blooms

than its sibling which Dana did not register at that time.

When I purchased 'Child of Roy' from Dana, I also purchased its sibling which he has since registered as 'Roy's Surprise'. This iris is a much better grower although it has smaller, more species like, white blooms that are heavily overlaid with purple veins. The plant is similar in size to 'Roy Davidson' in my garden and blooms during the same time period as 'Roy's Repeater'.



'Roy's Surprise'

The four offspring of 'Roy Davidson' that have been introduced all have purple based foliage and extend the season of iris bloom. They bloom for me between the Tall Bearded and Japanese iris bloom seasons. Three of them are good growers and they all provide different combinations of white and purple with yellow signals.

Dr. Irwin A. Conroe, (1899-1988) played a very large part in the early history of the Empire State Iris Society (ESIS), predecessor to the current 'Region 2 of the American Iris Society' organization. He was present at the ESIS organizational meeting in Elmira in 1953 and became Chairman of the By-Laws Committee. From then on he was continuously active in Society administration. He served as Auctioneer at area iris sales, Master of Ceremonies at regional meetings, and 3 separate terms of 3 years each as AIS RVP.

At the ESIS regional meeting in 1986, William Peck, on behalf of the Capital-Hudson Area, presented a proposal to honor Conroe for his service to ESIS. Named in honor of "Doc," an award was to be given annually to a living person, for exceptional service to ESIS. The first award was made in 1987 and was a dual award to both Bill Peck and "Doc" Conroe.

The original declaration of the award, as published in the ESIS Newsletter, Winter 1987, reads:

IRWIN A CONROE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL

- 1. There shall be an Empire State Iris Society Award to be known as the Irwin A. Conroe Distinguished Service Medal.
- 2. The medal shall be awarded annually to a living person selected to receive the Medal by an Irwin A. Conroe Award Committee to be appointed annually by the president of ESIS, consisting of three members of ESIS; provided, however, Irwin A. Conroe shall be one of the three committee members while he is able and willing to serve.
- 3. The Medal shall be awarded for distinguished service rendered while a member of ESIS, primarily for service to ESIS, but the Committee may also consider service to the American Iris Society.
- 4. In addition to the selection of the persons to receive the Medal, the Committee shall be responsible for the obtaining of medals, and for the preparation of suitable citations to be awarded with the Medal.
- 5. The Capital-Hudson Area will pay the costs of the first award to be made at the 1987 ESIS annual meeting; and intends to provide any amounts that may be required to cover costs of subsequent awards through 1996 to the extent such costs are not met by the Fund established as provided below.
- 6. A Fund will be established to be handled by the ESIS treasurer, who shall hold the same as a special fund of ESIS, and pay to the committee there from amounts requested by it for costs incurred in connection with awards. There shall be added to the Fund any income it may earn. Contributions designated for the Award shall be received into the fund.


