FROM YOUR REGIONAL VICE PRESIDENT

Is it spring yet? This is my third spring greeting for the AIS Region 2 Newsletter. Back in 2008 I was just learning what it was like to be an RVP and now it's 2010 and my final year serving the region in this capacity. It certainly has been an experience and most of it has been good.

The 2010 AIS Affiliation – yearly recertification of AIS affiliates – has been completed thanks to the conscientious efforts of the Affiliate Presidents and some of their helpers. When the Region 2 AIS Affiliation was completed in 2008, there were 147 AIS members residing in the counties represented by our six affiliates. The membership distribution was CHIS – 20, CNYIS – 24, GRIS – 26, HVIDS – 22, STIS – 27 and WNYIS – 28. As of February 1, 2010, there were 113 AIS members with the following membership distribution: CHIS – 18, CNYIS – 15, GRIS – 20, HVIDS – 12, STIS – 24 and WNYIS – 24. All of the affiliates in our Region have experienced a decline in membership as has AIS nationwide.

Declining membership and increasing costs are a concern at all levels of AIS and Region 2 is no exception. Your Region 2 Board of Executives over the past three years has been trying to hold costs down while proposing the same budget. We have been successful in keeping our expenditures lower than the revenue we've taken in, but the contributions from Affiliates have started to decline. If this trend continues, some budget cutting will be necessary in the near future. We are fortunate as volunteer organizations that we have a number of dedicated individuals who contribute a lot of time and effort to their clubs and Region 2. Many of the services the region provides (awards, newsletters, website, funding for the fall meeting) require money and we may soon reach a point at the region level where a lack of cash will limit what we are able to do.

The Region 2 Budget will be one of the challenges facing my replacement. My term of office ends this fall and we need someone to step forward to serve Region 2 and its affiliates. The current Region 2 Vice President has indicated that he will not be able to step into the office of RVP for 2011. It's not too early to start looking for someone to be a candidate for this position. If you are interested and willing to serve, please notify the nominating committee chairperson, John Colley. Good leadership is important for any organization and we have a lot of talented members who certainly would be great RVPs. Hopefully, one of you will be ready this fall for your chance to lead Region 2.

The election for next year's officers will be at our Fall Meeting which is being hosted this year by the Capital Hudson Iris Society. Marty Schafer and Jan Sacks from Joe Pye Weed's Gardens, Carlisle, Massachusetts, will be the featured speakers and provide judges training. Please mark the date, October 16, 2010, on your calendars. We hope you will join us there for fellowship, good food, guest speakers, awards, judges training and our annual Region 2 business meeting.

3. Welcome/Thank You & Additions/corrections to October 18, 2008 fall meeting minutes: RVP Vaughn Sayles welcomed 19 people to the meeting. Thank you expressed to this year's officers/affiliates chairs/committee chairs for all their hard work. No additions/corrections to above stated minutes. Motion made by Ron James, seconded by John Schueler to accept minutes. Carried.

4. Treasurer's Report: Ron James states the current balance is \$3,833.24. \$679.00 came in from the Fall Meeting Silent Auction with another \$35.00 due yet. \$1,830.59 was expended so far this year, \$1,579.00 has come in from Region 2 clubs (2 clubs have yet to donate: possibly \$1,000.00 from that) for a possible total of \$2,579.00. \$800.00 will be expended for the Fall Meeting. The fiscal books are January-December.

5. Affiliate Chair Reports:

A. CHIS: No report.

B. CNYIS: Report handed out; Donna states that CNYIS agrees to host the AIS Region 2 Fall Meeting for 2010 if CHIS does not host.

C. GRIS: Report handed out, Wendy Roller read the report.

D. HVIDS: Report handed out. Jim Robinowitz states it has been a good year with good meetings. Fundraising is not as robust this year, but they had two (2) sales.

F. STIS: Dorothy Stiefel states sales were down this year, but they took in enough.

G. WNYIS: Maria Gerbracht read report. George Eisenhardt has died. They had a show featuring historic iris on June 6th with 101 stalks plus designs and education exhibitions. They

also had a show on July 5th for Japanese iris and Icabana designs. Club member Dave Baehre has developed a flyer for "pre-sale" iris that he hands out and it has proven to be very helpful in successful sales for the club. They also advertise in the Upstate Gardeners Journal. She also states that Buffalo is hosting the 2012 Master Gardens show.

6. Committee Reports:

- A. Archives: Dorothy Stiefel states that she just received a couple of boxes of materials from GRIS area. She does request the donor address so an acknowledgement can be sent.
- B. Bylaws: No report.
- C. Creative Money: Mildred Horak states a big Thank You to HVIDS for their help. There was \$714.00 profit this year.
- **D. Exhibitions & Awards:** A report from Judy Tucholski states there were 6 shows with 442 entries this year.
- **E. Judges Training:** Wendy Roller handed out report and states 1.) If an area society is planning Judges Training, please let her know by the beginning of May as she needs to prepare the permissions for classroom and/or in-garden experiences. 2.) Region 2 judges and students earned 150+ hours of training this last year. A Master Judges has at least 15 years of experience and we have (5). We also have fifteen (15) Garden/Exhibitor Judges and one (1) G/E Judge being re-instated John Schueler. E. J. Mattson is to become an Apprentice Judge.
- **F. Membership:** Donna James states that there were problems with Exhibition Show Awards being available last year, but it is being worked on. Talk to Tom Gormley if you had problems and he will advise. She also states there has been a decline in membership.
- **G. Newsletter Editor:** Dorothy Stiefel reminds us that Newsletter information submitting dates are: Feb. 15th for Spring Newsletter and August 15th for Fall Newsletter. She states Thank You for all the info and help.
- H. Youth: No report.
- **I. Nominating:** John Colley states Thank You to Mildred Horak for her prior work as Secretary. Thank You to Sylvia Borglum for filling in for Mildred today. Nominations were listed in the Fall 2009 Newsletter and consist of:

- **9.** Budget for 2010: Ron James states there are no changes for 2010 budget. The maximum for projected expenditures is \$3, 815.00. Motion made by John Schueler, seconded by Maria Gerbracht to accept budget as presented. Carried.

10. Additional New Business:

- A. Rotation for hosting Fall Meeting: Helen Schueler states CNYIS is one (1) year out for hosting the meeting, CHIS would be next in rotation. Vaughn Sayles states he is willing to contact CHIS regarding the matter. He was not aware there was a rotation for hosting the meeting. Donna James suggested that possibly the Region 2 meeting could be downsized.
- **B.** Membership information: Maria Gerbracht asks if we have handout forms. Sometimes we wait 6-12 months to hear about new members. It is stated that we can go to the AIS website to look up information.
- C. Youth Members: John Colley states that STIS has 2 Youth members (ages 13 and 16 years old) and he asks for ideas about activities to encourage them in. Suggestions: visit their gardens, visit others gardens, teach hybridizing.
- **D.** Citation: Certificate of Proclamation by Joan Pagones, Supervisor of the Town of Fishkill was read at dinner. October 2nd and 3rd of 2009 is proclaimed "Iris Weekend" in the Town of Fishkill. Susan McDonald states the Silent Auction items went along with the Citation theme. Thank You to all.
- E. Membership Fees: Maria Gerbracht presents idea of expanding membership fees to "Local Only". She states this seems to be a trend being used to lower costs and increase local club memberships such as "WNY Iris & Perennial Society." Discussion followed. Is noted that in a local daylily/hosta group about 1/3 of the members belong to the national groups. If we can expand membership many social and educational connections are made - all at a lower cost. Maria states WNYIS is discussing this issue. It is also noted that with national membership the member also receives the Quarterly Bulletins. Also on the national level there are various benefit umbrellas such as tax issues, insurance, etc. These items are needed for coverage with tours, shows, sales, etc. Helen Schueler states there is no reason the local club cannot solicit people on a local, social level and then in a couple of years they can be encouraged to join at the national level. Each club needs to have at least 10 AIS members, others can be non-members. Each club has bylaws. She had a question regarding ESIS (Empire State Iris Society). This issue was addressed in 2000 by Region 2. There is no longer an ESIS. Region 2 of AIS has its own bylaws. Each club within the Region has their own bylaws. This is a must for the tax exempt status. Bob Plank can be contacted for further information on this. For New York State: Region 2 plus Affiliates CNYIS and WNYIS are tax exempt.
- 11. Adjournment: Motion made by John Schueler and seconded by Jim Robinowitz to adjourn meeting. Carried at 12:27 pm.

THE YEAR 2009 IN REVIEW:

During the period August 1, 2008 – July 31, 2009, Region 2 judges and student judges collectively earned over 150 hours of credit for attending classroom and in-garden training sessions. The training sessions were held in Kansas, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Mexico and New York.

The training sessions offered by Region 2 were as follows:

- 1. During the 2008 Region 2 Annual Fall Meeting weekend, two classroom sessions were taught by Ginny Spoon.
- 2. Two in-garden training classes on early blooming iris and Japanese iris were conducted by Donna James and Joanne Bassett.
- 3. Three apprentice and student judge in-garden sessions were led by David Baehre, Maria Gerbracht, and Frank Sorbello.
- 4. Two show bench tutoring sessions for two apprentice judges from Region 16 (Canada) and two student judges from Region 2 were taught by Joanne Bassett, Maria Gerbracht, Donna James and Judith Tucholski-Zon.

If approval is granted at the AIS Board Meeting, John Schueler will be reinstated as a Garden/Exhibition judge and E.J. Mattson will be appointed as an Apprentice Judge (effective January 1, 2010).

SPRING 2010 JUDGES TRAINING IN REGION 2

So far, one judges training opportunity has been scheduled in Region 2 during 2010. The course is in the planning stages. The finalized information on the session will be mailed to American Iris Society Master Judges, Garden/Exhibition Judges, Apprentice Judges, and Candidates for Judgeship in May, 2010.

This session is being sponsored by the Central New York Iris Society. The course will be presented by Helen Schueler at her home, located at 2620 Lamson Road, Phoenix, NY 13135. The course will cover rating bloomstalks and flowers; the grooming, transportation and presentation of bloomstalks; understanding show schedules; and the criteria iris judges use when judging bloomstalks. Some time will be spent in the garden in order to evaluate flowers and bloomstalks. Please let Helen know if you are planning to attend the course.

Of the 26 members in our group, 19 participated in some of our activities, while never more than 10 attended our meetings and programs. We have 5 active flower show judges and two working hard to become accredited student judges. We lost our dear friend, George Eisenhardt, after a long illness. He always contributed so much to our shows with the lovely stalks he grew.

A monthly newsletter or written notice goes out March through September to all our members keeping them informed about locally planned activities. This year we had meetings with programs in March, May, July and September. The July program was on garden judging of Japanese irises in the garden of iris judge Joanne Bassett. She prepared an official one hour Judges Training Program (with exam) which was followed by a delicious pot luck supper. Additionally, we enjoyed touring four of our members' gardens on June 10th when Siberians were at their best.

Once again, led by Judy Tucholski-Zon, we held two flower shows. Our Saturday, June 6th Show at Eastern Hills Mall featured TBs and Siberians, and several of us made an effort to show Historic irises because we were awarding the Ethel Peckham Award. 10 Exhibitors brought 101 entries to be judged.

David Baehre won Best Specimen of Show with TB 'Boxwinks Iditarod'. Five designers brought arrangements according to the theme of the show "As Time Goes By". Best Design of Show went to Maria Gerbracht. Joanne Bassett made a great educational exhibit on the judging of irises. The July 5, Japanese Iris Show was once again held at Rudolph Galley & Sons Greenhouses and beautifully staged in front of Japanese screens. This was a small show with only 22 specimens exhibited by 5 growers. Best Specimen of Show went to a Japanese Iris 'Picotee Princess' grown by Maria Gerbracht. Best Design of Show was earned by Judy Tucholski-Zon whose creation was complemented by a lovely oriental accessory. The Educational Exhibit Certificate was earned by Ikebana International Chapter 50. Two members demonstrated and exhibited some truly creative Japanese designs.

The August 1 Sale and Chinese Auction of New Introductions, also took place at Galley's Greenhouse in our favorite suburb of West Seneca, halfway between the north and south towns of Buffalo. Once again David Baehre arranged to purchase irises from a northern Hybridizer so we could hold a Pre-sale: a colorful flyer offering a choice of 12 named cultivars which may be ordered early and then picked up on the day of the sale. We usually make about \$300 on the Pre-sale and it allows everybody to purchase irises even if you know you will be out of the town on that day. Seven of us dug irises and contributed them, and our friends from Rochester donated their leftovers to our sale. We had MDB, SDB, MTB, BB, TB, Siberians, Japanese, Louisianas, Species and Species-Crosses for sale. Usually somebody takes the leftovers to the flea market for sale the next day. However, this year we donated them to two worthy causes: (1) The Buffalo and Eric County Botanical Gardens received all the early flowering irises, because in May 2012 they will be one of the hosts of the national convention of Garden Clubbers. (2) The remaining irises were donated to Graycliff, the summer home architect Frank Lloyd Wright designed for the Darwin D. Martin Family. To restore the garden, the Wright design called for an iris bed surrounding the reflection pool. We were honored to participate in this renovation which eventually will attract many visitors when they come to admire Buffalo's architecture.

We publicize our events monthly in the BUFFALO NEWS, Friday night gardening section. Bi-monthly notices go in the Magazine: UPSTATE GARDENER'S JOURNAL. And seasonal ads appear in the FIGURE 8, the publication for Western New York garden clubs of the National Garden Clubs of NY State. Additionally we distribute handouts at the Buffalo & Erie County Botanical Gardens and Galley's Nursery. New this year are e-mail notices our secretary sends out to anybody inquiring about any of our events, those who have purchased irises from us before or friends and family we wish to send a reminder.

At our September meeting we re-elected our present officers. We are working hard to promote the love of growing irises, but our numbers are not growing. I'm interested in your suggestions on what to do to change this trend.



Anna is known as the Flower Lady of Elma. She lives on Bowen Road, a busy northsouth route on the eastern side of Buffalo. Many a driver has slammed on his/her brakes to catch a glimpse of the gorgeous display of flowers in her front yard. This happens most often when her favorite Japanese irises are in bloom. However. there is a parade of blooms in her garden beginning in March when thousands of snowdrops and crocus burst forth and ending with the last mum in November. People stop all the time to chat with her about growing better flowers. Anna has worshipped in her garden - God's Cathedral - and co-created with the Lord when she hybridized Japanese irises and daylilies in the last 15 of her 90 year life. With weeding and transplanting help, she still grows MDB, SDB, IB, MTB, TB, Siberian, Louisiana, species and of course Japanese irises. Among them are the seven cultivars of Japanese irises she hybridized and introduced. At the 2008 Japanese Iris Society convention, her last introduction, a dwarf Japanese iris 'Miss Buffalo' drew enough attention that John Coble notified her they have included this iris for sale in the 2009 Ensata Catalog.

Anna is being honored because of the many folks she got "hooked on growing irises". Demonstrating her enthusiasm for growing, showing and hybridizing new varieties of irises, she has brought many iris society members into the fold over the 30 years that she has belonged to the American Iris Society. Every year she would exhibit irises at the WNYIS show, and then stay for hours to talk to show visitors. Kathy Guest-Shadrack gave her the "Sitting Pretty Award" for selling "The Joy of Growing Irises" to folks. Her loyalty to the Society was also demonstrated because, since 1985, Anna has donated annually around \$500 worth of irises she grew to the WNYIS sale. There were so many irises to prepare that even her husband Martin and daughter Maria pitched in and helped dig, clean and label rhizomes. And then she would stay many hours at the sale showing customers how to grow Japanese irises. Sale customers today still ask "Where is Anna?"

Anna started growing seeds of Japanese irises which her friend Al Wirtz had hybridized. For years Mom and I would go see his Japanese irises in his small garden in Kenmore and at exhibits when he took bloom stalks to local banks for folks to enjoy their beauty. Her hybridized lines contain forerunners of Art Hazzard's from Michigan and a Dr. Nigishi's from Japan with whom Al exchanged seeds at a national convention. The Nigishi seedlings are the shorter types because in Japan they were grown in pots for enjoyment on indoor altars. In honor of Al Wirtz and Anna Rettig, WNYIS gives to the best Japanese Iris in our local show the WIRTZ-RETTIG Award

Anna Rettig (cont.)

Every visitor in her garden can tell you about the magnificent green-thumb Anna has. When friends would auction and win expensive flowers at conventions, they would bring them to her to multiply. Anna has a special growing knack, a direct line of blessing from the Lord. She calls it "MISTUS - CHRISTUS" which translated from German means: where there is manure, there is Christ (blessing things to grow). She learned that lesson from her grandmother Schmidt in Yugoslavia who taught her how to garden. As a widow (with no nursery in town) Grossmutter Schmidt would grow crops of flowers and sell them for income. Her most famous crops were spring pansies, which Anna cared for. In the streets, she had to gather oxen manure and make MANURE TEA which she used to feed the pansies. In spring, when folks came to buy the blooming plants, Anna would cry, "They are taking the prettiest ones!" Grossmutter consoled her with "There will still be more beautiful ones coming into bloom". Grossmutter showed her how to collect and start seed, and how to hybridize to create double Stock flowers by cross pollinating the doubles with the singles, because only the singles produce seeds from which new doubles will grow. To this day, she still ties strings on the special seed pods to be harvested and grow new seedlings from. Anna's legacy is that several of her seven grandchildren enjoy gardening, and so do five of her 13 greatgrand children. All grandchildren and greatgrand children visit to enjoy her garden with her. Anna still enjoys growing new varieties of flowers, "more beautiful ones coming into bloom!"

At the November 2009 Board Meeting in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the Board of Directors of the American Iris Society approved a General Fund deficit budget of approximately \$14,000. In an attempt to prevent this deficit from eroding the AIS Capital Reserves the Board of Directors is taking several steps to eliminate this projected shortfall. Jill Bonino, Treasurer of AIS, mailed a letter to RVPs outlining the steps that AIS is taking to reduce costs and increase revenue. Included in these measures are increasing the registration fee for a new iris cultivar to \$15.00 and cutting printing costs by providing for electronic voting by judges and a new size for the AIS Bulletin. Even with these changes they still anticipate a deficit and two additional remedies are being pursued.

AIS' primary means of eliminating this shortfall is a request for donations. Donations helped AIS survive an unexpected budget increase a few years ago that was precipitated by a dramatic increase in the cost of securing insurance for our activities. Donations are to be made to the AIS General Fund and should be sent to Lynn Williams, AIS Donations Secretary, with the designation of being Unrestricted Donations to the General Fund. Lynn's address is 25415 Salmon Place, Willits, CA 95490. Donations of any size will help AIS with their budget problem. AIS members, Affiliates and Regions are encouraged to make a contribution. Please consider making a donation to AIS at your Affiliate Meetings this spring.

A second approach that is being utilized by a number of other plant/garden societies to generate extra revenue is a new one for AIS. The program is called "Bloomin' Buck\$" with Brent and Becky's Bulbs. AIS registered with Brent and Becky's Bulbs to be part of this program. Go to the website, www.bloominbucks.com, and select AIS from the pull down menu. Anything that you order will generate a percentage contribution to AIS. This contribution to AIS only applies to on-line orders and orders through "Bloomin' Buck\$" are not qualified for additional discounting. We are all gardeners so check it out. You may find some books, bulbs, tools, supplements, gift certificates or other items that you are looking for and your purchase would help AIS.

The AIS Board of Directions is making a courageous effort to keep membership dues frozen while meeting increasing costs that the AIS is facing each year. Any help that we as members can provide individually, as Affiliates and as Regions will be greatly appreciated. The financial burden of providing insurance alone for our activities is a heavy one and one that is necessary for any viable organization today. The American Iris Society is our organization and it needs our support.

50 years ago—1960

The Empire State Iris Society Newsletter was published quarterly. During the year, Edwin Rundlett of Staten Island became editor, replacing Tom Jacoby who had been selected to become editor of the Bulletin of the American Iris Society.

Dr. Irwin A. Conroe was both President of the Empire State Iris Society (ESIS) and RVP of AIS Region 2. This was the year in which ESIS officially affiliated with the American Iris Society, and it was the only affiliate in the region. The club was divided into 9 separate "Areas," some of which are now represented by individual Affiliate clubs. The "Areas" were Binghamton, Capital-Hudson, Elmira, Niagara-Southwest, Northern, Rochester, Three Islands, and Tri-County.

The Three Islands Area hosted the ESIS show (Reg. 2's Affiliate show) at Hicks Nursery, Westbury, Long Island, on May 28. Judges for the horticultural section were Dr. L.F. Randolph, AIS President, Dr. Irwin A. Conroe, ESIS President and Reg. 2 RVP, and Mrs. F.W. (Bee) Warburton, President of the Median Iris Society. 41 exhibitors showed 302 entries of 187 cultivars, including 40 seedlings. Grand Champion was the iris 'Harbor Blue' (Schreiner, 1954) shown by Shirley Moore. William Peck, Jr. won the Silver Medal for most blue ribbons and Miriam Durvea won the Bronze Medal for second most. In the artistic section, featuring 31 entries by 17 exhibitors, the Purple Rosette was won by Nevalda Liberi of the Plainview Garden Club.

The Rochester Area held its annual iris exhibition in the Brighton Town Hall on June 5.

Two members of the Binghamton Area collaborated on a landscape design entry for the Spring Garden Show held at the Roberson Memorial.

The Capitol-Hudson Area held a show on June 4th at the Glenville Town Hall in Scotia. The Purple Rosette for best design went to Mrs. Schlansker of Schenectady. In the horticultural section, Best Specimen was won by Joseph Ryan. The AIS Silver Medal went to Fred Ammerall, and the Bronze Medal went to Dr. Irwin Conroe.

The Syracuse Area also held a show, on June 4th at the Niagara Mohawk Building in Syracuse. There were 221 entries in 57 classes. Mary Hall won "Best in Show" with a stalk of 'Star Shine' (Wills, 1948). Clint Ziems won the AIS Silver Medal and Lowell Hawthorne the Bronze Medal.

Iris auction/sales were held and reported by the Binghamton, Capitol-Hudson, Elmira, Niagara-Southwest, Rochester, Syracuse, Three Islands, and Tri-County Areas.

The annual business meeting and banquet was held in Syracuse, with guest speaker Mr. Leslie Laking, Director of the Royal Botanical Garden in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.

25 Years Ago----1985

The Empire State Iris Society Newsletter was published 3 times a year; Spring, Summer, and Fall/Winter. Albert F. deGroat was the editor, with Mary Pat Engel and Gregory Schifferli as contributing editors.

President of ESIS and Region 2 RVP was Lillian Gristwood. There were 4 active Areas; Capital-Hudson, Niagara-Southwest, Rochester, and Syracuse.

The Affiliate iris show was held in Buffalo at the Eastern Hills Mall. There were 18 exhibitors showing 151 entries. Best specimen of show was 'Cascadian Skies,' (Aitken, 1983), brought in by Greg Schifferli. Best seedling was a superbly branched near white Siberian, TSB 85W, exhibited by Frank Galas. Greg Schifferli won the AIS Silver Medal for most blues, and it took a count of second place, and finally, third place ribbons to break a tie and award the Bronze Medal to Anna Rettig.

The Rochester Area also held a show, at the Greece Towne Mall. There were 125 entries brought by 16 exhibitors. Best Specimen was 'Song of Norway,' (Luihn, 1979), exhibited by Greg Schifferli. The AIS Silver Medal went to Madge Hoar, and the Bronze Medal to Greg Schifferli. Wendy Roller received a Special Bronze Medal for her educational exhibit.

In the annual AIS symposium of favorite irises, 45 Region 2 members voted the following favorites: 1) Stepping Out; 2) Bayberry Candle; 3) Mary Frances; 4) tie—Bride's Halo, Mystique, Victoria Falls and Son of Star; 5) Song Of Norway; 6) tie—Cup Race, Going My Way; 7) tie—Vanity, Shipshape; 8) Pink Taffeta; 9) tie—Autumn Leaves, Babbling Brook; 10) tie—Beverly Sills, Camelot Rose, Christmas Time, Dusky Dancer, Five Star Admiral, Kilt Lilt, Leda's Lover, Ringo, Sheer Poetry, Study in Black, Wine and Roses.

Each of the active Areas held auction/sales in 1985. Total income from all the sales was \$3467.35.

The annual regional meeting was held on Oct. 5, at the Quality Gateway Inn in Rochester.

The Fall/Winter edition of the Newsletter contained a page dedicated to William McGarvey, Ph.D., prominent former Region 2 member who had died in Arkansas in December. McGarvey was ESIS president and Region 2 RVP, past president of the Siberian Iris Society, an AIS Hybridizer's Medal recipient (1976), and a world-renowned authority on Siberian Irises. Many of his introductions, including Ego, Superego, Augury, Pink Haze, Dewful, Wing on Wing, Maggie Smith, and Temper Tantrum may still be found growing in Region 2 gardens today.

Dr. E. Roy Epperson

Dr. E. Roy Epperson, President of the American Iris Society and former President of the Siberian Iris Society, died at his home on Thursday, January 21th, 2010. Edward Roy Epperson was born on October 14th, 1932 in Burnsville, MS. He received his doctorate in Chemistry from the University of the Pacific in 1965.

Dr. Epperson was married to Virginia Albert Epperson on August 19th, 1960. His wife preceded him in death in 1996. They were both on the faculty at Elon College from 1957-1966, where Dr. Epperson was an Assistant Professor of Chemistry. Dr. Epperson was a respected faculty member and director of administrative affairs at High Point College for over 40 years.

Dr. Epperson demonstrated his commitment to his community through his dedicated volunteer service to many agencies. He was a devoted member of Christ United Methodist Church.

Dr. Epperson's avocation was his garden, with a particular love of iris and hostas. He also greatly enjoyed the art of cooking, which he learned at the age of 14 from his mother on a wood-burning stove. He was known locally for his wedding cakes, Yorkshire pudding, for hosting Christmas open houses for friends and University personnel, and for feeding his family really well!

Dr. Epperson is survived by two daughters and four grandchildren. Roy, as he preferred to be known, was a gentleman in every sense of the word and members of the American Iris Society greatly mourn his loss.
