

What an iris year this has been for me. The biggest challenge was having one of the

four guest iris gardens for the 2012 AIS National Convention in southern California. Preparing for it pretty much eclipsed everything else and with growing nearly a thousand guest irises (over one hundred of which were rebloomers)

I'm afraid other parts of my iris garden suffered neglect.

I was delighted to have the opportunity to grow reblooming iris introductions and seedlings for a number of hybridizers from around the country. Southern California is like rebloom paradise and if an iris has the


potential for rebloom it usually will fly its colors. Give them sufficient water, fertilizer and a little extra TLC and the rewards are abundant. Believe it or not, January is usually our best rebloom month and sometimes this winter blossoming crescendos right into spring.

It was fortunate that we had a pleasant fall and mild winter in 2011/12 because it rewarded us with very strong rebloom among the guest irises from early September through February. Especially nice was the opportunity to grow and evaluate seedlings and introductions from less known rebloom hybridizers. I look forward to keeping in touch and watching the market for their introductions.

It would be a real benefit to increase communication between rebloom iris hybridizers and connoisseurs east and west of the Rocky Mountains. What's seen and available in iris catalogs and websites from the most noted growers/hybridizers in west coast states is not fully representative of the reblooming iris community. Having a national convention guest garden with REs from hybridizers all over the country has helped me to realize that there are many new beauties that need recognition (and new hybridizers that need encouragement). Please! Keep up the good work and don't be

shy about sending your rebloomers to national conventions. Your irises WILL be noticed and admired even though some may bloom prior to peak convention time.

- As of December 31, 2011, total assets are \$9,829.87 in checking and savings.
- Char will email the balance sheet and budget to the Board.
- Both pending approval.Board reminded to hand in their receipts to the Treasurer.

- Southwestern: Riley Probst_— Handed out copies of the Record of Iris Rebloom used by the Society. Riley, also Facebook administrator for RIS, mentioned RIS' Facebook page has 189 members as compared to 98 this time last year.




Midwestern Report By Dir. Mary Lou S.-Young


What a brutal year it has been! The winter of 2011/12 was so mild, it's being called the winter that wasn't. Highs consistently in the 80s in

March were followed by a cold, dry April, with lows in the 20s. Most spring stalks withered

away. Drought continued until the end of August and shed leaves littered the ground. Widespread crop failures through large areas of the region gave little hope for any rebloom. When trees are dying, what chance do reblooming irises have?

And yet, some reports came in. Some folks were lucky enough to

At my own place, outside the northeast corner of Indianapolis, the star performer among the introduced varieties was 'Over And Over' TB (S. Innerst 2001), which bloomed every rhizome big enough starting in mid-August and set a pod in the fall. The biggest surprise was 'Bolder Boulder' TB (T. McGee 2000), reblooming for the first time after about seven years here. Both were

reset in 2011 and undoubtedly benefitted from extra water, planted near my new seedlings. Four miles west of me in Lawrence, IN,

'Delta Lady' TB (L. Lauer 2009) rebloomed

aggressively in Virginia's Iris Garden, owned by Janet Wilke and named after her mother.

I'm proud to say that my own recent registrations, 'Blushing Again' TB (M. Swann-Young 2012), (Tenderly X October Splendor) and 'Nobody But Me' TB (M. Swann-Young

pollen fertile despite the challenging climate last spring. Both also rebloomed readily despite having roots disturbed during the drought. I may be blushing a little myself for having registered 'Blushing Again' at 30 inches, when it showed me 33 inch stalks this fall. Maybe, just maybe, they got a little extra care.

I've been addicted to reblooming irises and making planned crosses for 10 years. Somewhere along the line, I also became addicted to seeing new iris faces. The one really bright spot among the carnage of my garden last fall was a Misty Twilight X Stardock seedling (#10-241 ARE) planted in 2011. Just for fun, I allow myself one space age cross per year with Misty

Twilight. Watching two stalks of this seedling growing one to two inches each day through September and open near the end of the month with five branches and a spur, at least 13 buds and 43 and 44 inches tall was a blast.

I'll go out beyond a limb and into the twigs to say this one may turn out to be the best tall bearded, cold climate, fall cycle rebloomer I've ever seen, all things considered. It has yet to go through a real Indiana winter and a sopping wet Indiana spring, but reblooming like this while growing seven feet from a 20 foot maple tree is impressive. I won't quibble over the lack of appendages.







Mesilla Valley Iris Society 2012 Rebloom Report

Mesilla Valley Iris Society is in southern New Mexico, just above the Mexican border. A mild fall meant that we had reblooming irises well into December. I counted seven in my garden on December 9th. I've never had irises rebloom so late. I picked all the blooms showing color that evening since the first major winter storm was coming the next day. The good news is that some of my seedlings have stalks. The bad news is that they won't rebloom before it

freezes. It has been a dry year and rebloomers do better when they get rainfall. However, many MVIS members reported some rebloom. 'Double Shot' TB (G. Sutton 2000) and 'Violet Music' TB (C. Mahan 1991) have been the best rebloomers this year. Eloise Young reported having good luck planting rebloomers in cotton burr compost. I have good luck planting rebloomers in areas where I have done trench composting. —Scarlett Ayers, MVIS, Region 23

Northwestern Report By Director Robin Shadlow

This year was unusual in the Northwest. At least as far as I can tell based on what people who have lived here say. Spring came very

late. Bloom was delayed, but we did have good bloom when it got rolling. Then came June. June felt down right COLD! Cold days, colder nights. By the time July came, the stalks were on the way. By the end of July, 'Rosalie Figge' TB (J. McKnew 1993) was blooming more profusely than in May. Suddenly, seedlings I had grown for many years in Nebraska which had never once offered to rebloom started putting up rebloom stalks.

When summer finally came, the new stalks stopped, but as the late rains started so did the stalks. As I write this, we still

have bloom. Many of the old favorites are blooming right now. 'Rosalie Figge' TB (J. McKnew 1993), 'Days of Summer' TB (T. Stanek 2002), 'Bernice's Legacy' TB (B. Miller 2000) and 'Echo Location' TB (B. Wilkerson 2007) are still going full steam. 'Starring Encore' TB (D. Spoon 2008) is blooming well despite its relocation in July. Actually, all of the irises listed above have started blooming since being moved in July. Rebloomers do appreciate virgin soil and mine have been blooming very strongly.

'Starring Encore' TB (D. Spoon 2008) is especially interesting to me with the parentage of (Daughter Of Stars X Starring.) Given 'Starring Encore's' repeat performance here, I plan to make more crosses with 'Starring' in hopes of increasing the color palette of rebloomers.

Early summer performers included 'Cornhusker' TB (T. Stanek 2005), 'Patty Ann' BB (T. Stanek 2005) and 'Blueberry Tart' SDB (C.

> Chapman 2002). 'Blueberry Tart' has proven to be a reliable rebloomer in Oregon as it was in Nebraska. It tends to have single stalks in the summer and fall, and while not an impressive clump effect, it is a lovely color and is always welcome in our garden. 'Autumn Wine' BB (V. Christopherson 2003)

'Renascent' TB (B. Hager 2005) all bloomed in late October and early November.

Some new irises to rebloom for me since moving to the Northwest are 'Wearing Rubies' TB (B. Blyth 2001/02), 'Love Is All Around' TB

(J.T. Aitken 2005) and 'Florentine Silk' TB (K. Keppel 2005). 'Love is All Around' had lovely wide form, a big step forward for rebloom. 'Florentine Silk's' bloom was timely as it had just been announced as the Dykes Medal winner shortly before blooming. Its wide ruffled form on good summer stalks make for a welcome addition to off season bloom. Based on what I have heard from Keith Keppel, late summer rebloom is not uncommon for 'Florentine Silk'.

I did check with Mid-

America to see what is in store for us in 2013 that reblooms for them. 'Twice Is Nice' TB (P. Black 2013) is very aptly named. It has tall stalks with great branching. There are also two MDBs coming our way, 'Black Olive' MDB (P. Black 2013) and 'Beetlejuice' MDB (P. Black

2013). The names have to be approved yet, but they will be lovely new additions to our selection of new irises to try out.

Rebloom at Keith Keppel's place included 'Lording It' TB (B. Blyth 2009/10) Blyth

has also reported that this reblooms for him in Australia. One of the wider rebloomers started blooming in August, 'Emma's Laughter' TB (G. Poole 2008). This has not yet gotten the distribution it deserves. It bloomed heavily in the fall of 2011, again in spring 2012 and was going strong again in fall 2012. 'Florentine Silk' TB (K. Keppel 2005) also rebloomed in the Keppel garden in the late summer. 'Lunar Whitewash' TB (S. Innerst 2003) rebloomed in September. There is also a seedling I have

seen rebloom there each of the last three years. It is expected to be introduced as 'Cotallion Gown'.

There is still time for a few more to make it before that first frost. We may have irises for the holidays if the weather holds!

Austin, Texas Region 17 Fall Meeting with Mike Lockatell on Reblooming Irises

Mike Lockatell, a hybridizer from Virginia, was the principal speaker and Judges Training instructor for the Region 17 annual meeting held in Austin, TX in August. His topic was

reblooming irises and he passionately promoted them. Mike provided an interesting program showing Lloyd Zurbrigg irises that he has used for crosses in his seedlings as well as many other rebloomers from various hybridizers. Mike has had access to the Lloyd Zurbrigg studbook and has thoroughly enjoyed searching the background of many rebloomers.

Mike stated that the definition of a reblooming or remontant iris is one that blooms in the spring and again in the same growing season. He said that there are five distinguishable behavior patterns in modern reblooming irises: RIS

Rebloomers (Cyclic Rebloomers) which complete two distinct cycles of bloom, Multiple Blooming Iris which send up a bloomstalk repeatedly at anytime throughout the growing

season, Repeaters which produce additional bloomstalks with unpredictable regularity shortly after the initial bloom season, Sporadic Rebloomers which unpredictably produce bloomstalks at various times during the growing season and Secondary Stalk Rebloomers which are rare, but occur when rhizomes send up secondary stalks in the same growing season.

He encouraged everyone to grow rebloomers and to send the names of any iris cultivars which rebloomed for them to their RIS Area Director.

We must make a small name change in our 2012 RIS introduction that is being offered to any and all who take out a triennial membership in the Reblooming Iris Society. The original name for this introduction was 'Summer Pearls'. However, the AIS Registrar thought it was too close to an iris registered forty-nine years ago and recommended a name modification. On the 14th of December we had our first killing frost which put an end to rebloom.

However, there are still a few stalks just coming on so maybe there will be more bloom as

no frost is projected for the next several weeks.

We will try to have some 'Pearls of Summer' iris in pots at the AIS National Convention in Dallas.

This iris is an excellent SA rebloomer with semi-flaring falls, 12 or more buds, three to four branches and triple-socketed terminals. More informa-

tion on the purchase of 'Pearls of Summer' will be in the 2012 Spring *Recorder*.

Many thanks to George Sutton for donating this beauty to the Reblooming Iris Society. 'Pearls of Summer' has all of the modern improvements of once-blooming irises.



Rebloom Visits Austin By Mike Lockatell

Reblooming bearded iris culture can be a frustrating experience. Fall flowering traits are still not well understood. Weather and micro-climates can dramatically alter yearly results. Some varieties are so fickle, soil types can drive success or failure. Rebloom breeders end up using instincts to make their best combinations each spring to obtain more reliable offspring to flourish in any growing condition.

The late Dr. Lloyd Zurbrigg convinced Mike Lockatell me to pursue remontant iris development. His

wise council lasted five years. As health and growing space limited both gardening and breeding, his best instruction was confined to weekly Sunday night phone calls. Our discussions usually focused on researching registrations to find new avenues to explore with next spring's cross pollinations. The missing element was always

concrete performance data on potential candidates. New releases hitting the marketplace around this time such as 'Again And Again'

TB (S. Innerst 1999) and 'Over And Over' TB (S. Innerst 2001) received scant attention and minimal distribution. Due to their obscurity, these stellar selections were never on our radar screen.

A major blessing for me over the past few years has been opportunities to speak on rebloom beyond AIS Region 4 borders. My travels began in 2010 with early spring stops in Pittsburgh, PA (AIS Region 2) and Kansas City, MO (AIS Region 16). Indianapolis, IN (AIS Region 6) was the scene in March 2011 for separate programs on judge's training and general rebloom culture plus recommended varieties. Could fall flowering succeed in these locales? A final verdict has yet to be rendered.

The only shortcomings to my Missouri and Indiana appearances were my luggage did not follow me back to the Richmond Airport. Upon arriving home from the Indy trip, the phone was ringing. I assumed the caller was an airline representative prepared to give me more bad news. After calming down, Pat Byrne from the Austin, TX Iris Society was innocently inviting me to be the keynote speaker at the Region

17 Summer Meeting in August 2012. My travelling pitfalls had an unexpected silver lining. An opportunity materialized to explore rebloom's promise in the Lone Star State.

Pittsburgh, Kansas City and Indianapolis can see promising fall flowering derailed by early October hard freezes. Texas, on

the other hand, has a longer rebloom season. If bearded iris clumps could survive summer drought and constant triple-digit daytime heat, would night temperatures below 60° F arriving in late September or early October trigger timely fall bloom on rebloom's best tall bearded selections? My only guide was results from Central Virginia.

Texas is still reeling from the effects of a devastating drought in 2011. Austin luckily received periodic rain prior to my visit to keep landscaping green and healthy. Supplemental watering, however, was still necessary to insure happy bearded iris plantings. Bonnie and Hooker Nichols are currently managing a weekly watering schedule to maintain the 2013 and 2014 AIS National Convention tour gardens in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Unless local government agencies shut off the tap, plantings should be in fine shape to captivate attendees to these two signature AIS events.

As spring turned into summer in Central Virginia, remontants in my public display bed at J. Sargeant Reynolds Community College in

Goochland, VA (west of Richmond) started reblooming in the final days of May. Wow! Flowering continued through June and July despite sporadic dryness and intense summer heat. Performance came as a complete surprise.

Tall bearded selections leading the way were 'Again And Again' TB (S. Innerst 1999), 'Another Bridge' TB (B. Wilkerson 2005), 'Coro-

nation of David' TB (B. Miller 1999), 'Gate of Heaven' TB (L. Zurbrigg 2004), 'Northward Ho' TB (L. Zurbrigg 1991), 'Over And Over' TB (S. Innerst 2001), 'Pink Attraction' TB (E. Hall 1988) and 'Sunny Disposition' TB (L. Zurbrigg 1991).

Sensational medians adding to the fun were 'Twiggy' BB (D. Spoon 2004), 'I'll Be Back' IB (J.T. Aitken 2004), 'Midsummer Night's Dream' IB (L. Baumunk 1999), 'Lady Emma' MTB (F. Jones 1986) and 'Sailboat Bay' SDB (L. Zurbrigg 2001). My unexpected results surely added some extra flavor and energy to my Austin speaking efforts.

ed and Louisiana irises. Visitors will have the unique chance to monitor garden performance over a two-year period.

My digital presentation to close the twoday event focused on culture tips for success-

ful rebloom and a recommended variety review in all bearded classes based on Central Virginia and AIS Region 4 yearly results. Can Texans replicate Mid-Atlantic results? If the answer is an eventual yes, rebloom can count on invaluable flow of performance data from its southernmost boundaries to drive future breeding development and distribution.

My thanks to everyone that participated in the annual symposium. The number of ballots being returned is increasing every year. It is members like you that spread the word about reblooming irises. It remains a

goal of the Reblooming Iris Society to educate the public about irises that bloom more than once in a season. It is still amazing how many people have no idea that rebloomers exist. It does not matter what part of the country or what part of the world one grows irises, there are reblooming irises for that place.

This is where the RIS Cumulative Checklist and the RIS Facebook page come in very handy. Check them out to discover what will rebloom in your area. The RIS Checklist has the agricultural zones listed that have had reported rebloom. There are a few hundred fans of rebloom that regularly report to RIS Facebook from gardens all over the globe. The RIS Area Directors have reports in all Recorders that list irises reblooming in their areas. RIS Facebook has daily reports on what is blooming where and in what USDA agricultural zone. Make lists, visit gardens during spring bloom and ask the garden proprietor what reblooms in that garden. Watch the RIS Recorder and the RIS 4th of July Rebloom News electronic newsletter for fund raising sales as there is a good chance the reblooming iris you may be looking for will be listed.

Don't expect rebloom the first year. If you do get rebloom the first year turn cartwheels of joy across your front yard. By the second summer, fall or winter, rebloom should have presented. Reblooming irises must have moisture every ten days to two weeks during the heat of summer for rebloom. Because of the constant growth, occasional food and regular water is a requirement for rebloom.

2012 Reblooming Iris Society Symposium Results

Always in zone 9 and often in zone 8 there is a short and mild winter compared to the rest of the country. Rebloomers in these areas must have a little water in January if there has been no rain for a while. The same holds true for the summer months. Zone 9 receives little or no summer rain so rebloomers must have summer water. But beware! Water in the

evenings only. Watering during the day in high temperatures can rot the irises.

Several votes had to be disqualified this year. Votes cannot be accepted for irises that have not yet been introduced. That lovely rebloomer may have been blooming six months in your garden, but unless it has been introduced for at least two growing seasons it will not make the count. Maybe the hybridizer gave out stock of potential rebloomers before introduction and a few members have been growing it and evaluating rebloom. However, votes will not be accepted until two growing seasons after introduction.

One voter asked why more good irises could not be on the ballot. Space is always a problem and printing is expensive. With the exception of the newer irises the voter determines what appears on the Symposium Ballot. Example: 'Rosalie Figge' was introduced in the 1990s and has not been on the current Symposium. The Symposium was discontinued for several years and when it started again, only irises introduced from the year 2000 were on the ballot. Until this year good ole' "Rosalie" did not receive enough votes to meet the criteria. Write-in votes have brought her back onto the Symposium where she will remain for at least three more years.

This is how the decision is made as to what is on the ballot and what is not.

1. Any reblooming iris that is no longer eligible for AIS Awards and has received no votes for the past three years will be removed from the Symposium Ballot.

2. Any reblooming iris that has not received any AIS Awards and receives less than nine cumulative votes in four years will be removed from the Symposium Ballot.

3. Any reblooming iris removed from the Symposium Ballot for lack of votes will be placed back on the ballot if nine or more cumulative write-in votes are counted in four consecutive years.

4. No reblooming iris will be placed on the Symposium Ballot or write-in votes accepted until two bloom seasons after introduction.

5. All irises registered as rebloomers/remontants by the hybridizer will be included on the Symposium Ballot two years after introduction. If not registered as a rebloomer, with a minimum of nine cumulative write-in votes in the third year after introduction, the iris will be placed on the ballot as a rebloomer.

Keep track of your votes. If there are more votes than allotted for the section then, sad to say, all votes in that section must be disqualified. However, if a phone number is included on the Symposium, the Chairperson can phone you, email another ballot and another vote can be taken. Please write your comments legibly, if we can't read it the editor can't print it.

All irises introduced in 2011 and 2012 will not be included on the next ballot as the next ballot will be available before spring bloom time of 2013.

Every year there are folks that want to change the mailing dates of the symposium. We are always open to suggestions from the members. No date seems to be a good one for one and all. There are several reasons for selecting the fall return date for ballots. First of all, there are only two *RIS Recorders* per year, each with a printing deadline. Most members have expressed wishes for the ballot to be available in the spring. Many members have also stated that the early fall return date is ahead of the rebloom in their area.

Rebloom must be determined over a two-year period. Therefore, anyone receiving the ballot should have been evaluating the reblooming irises for awhile so that the ballot return date should not matter. As the American Iris Society Judges Handbook recommends, growth and bloom should be evaluated over two consecutive years.
